
Tartars In 42-0 Win

Long Runs Highlight Adding Machine Win

 Seize-pills must have been just what the doctor ordered for the Tartar gridlers.
 Coach Cliff Graybell's Torrance High crew, which had gone through spotty practice periods earlier in the week because of a meningitis scare which swept through the school, wound up on the long end of a 42-0 score Friday evening over Montebello in a non-league tilt here.
 Scatback Harry Bayliss got on the scoreboard first with a 13-yard run to pay dirt in the first quarter, and end Larry Roy took a Montebello handoff into the end zone late in the second quarter to give the Tartars a 14-0 halftime lead.
 Jones Shines, however, to bring the fans to their feet with his tuning in the third quarter which ended up in the end zone for the Tartars' third score. Jones carried the ball a total of 67 yards on the series of downs, cutting through tackle and guard for long gainers on each try. He plunged over from the three-yard line for the t.d.
 The Oilers' only serious threat was broken up early in the fourth quarter when Bobby Kulp intercepted a pass near his own 20-yard line that looked like a sure t.d. The visitors never could put together another drive.
 Goes for 85
 Following Kulp's interception, Bayliss knifed his way across right tackle and scooted 85 yards down the left sidelines all the way to put the Tartars out ahead 28-0.
 Jones again took the ball over after the Tartars had moved down to the one-yard line for the fifth tally, and Jim Farrar passed a 33-yard strike to Burt Smith for the final touchdown.
 End Larry Roy booted six for six on the point after touchdown tries—in fact, he booted seven for six. He had to kick one twice when the Tartars were offside on the conversion attempt.
 Sharp downfield blocking and heady signal calling, added to the experience of such Tartar veterans as Bayliss, Jones, Jim Murphy, Danny Mayers, and others, was the difference between the two clubs.
 The Tartars will travel to Redondo next Friday night to resume league play against the Seahawks.

Score Tied At Half As 'Tech Surprises

 It looked for a while like the mighty Warriors had forgotten the salt to sprinkle on the 'Hawks' tail as the El Camino variety narrowly caught a win at their home last Friday eve.
 The heavily favored locals battled a surprisingly strong Harbor Tech squad and finally handed them a 14-6 setback and thousands of TV screen quarterbacks.
 Harbor pass from the arms of Don Holmes on a dead gallop and kept going 52 yards for the TD.
 Cornell Tallies
 Minutes later, the rejuvenated Warriors powered to the Tech 2-yard line where QB Bill Crawford handed off to Don Cornell, who swept around right end for the counter. Ken Swearingin's second conversion cleared the uprights.
 Crawford performed well during the night, but held his passing to a minimum—perhaps the reason for the low score. He carried the seed several times himself, but failed to turn in the ball game recorded last week when the locals burst Bakerfield's Little Rose Bowl bubble.
 Jim Carmichael's knee-high running proved invaluable as he cracked through the line for long gains. He was injured late in the third period and watched the rest of the clash from the sidelines.
 Harbor Retaliates
 Harbor Tech bopped over their tally late in the final quarter after a sensational pass by Merrill to Ralph Moreno, which was good for more than 80 yards. Merrill evaded at least seven tacklers as he pranced from left to right, then after a mad dash to the sidelines, hurled across to Moreno on the far side.
 From their own seven, the Hawks moved on until Jack Hernandez blasted over from a yard out.
 An earlier Tech TD was nullified by an off-sides penalty after a sixty-yard pass play.
 The squeeze win gave El Camino a 3-0 Metropolitan Conference lead. They'll tackle the Long Beach Vikings at Long Beach next Saturday night.

 Torrance booted off as Montebello came to life—out rushing and out playing the locals for the rest of the game. They drove to the four and scored a few moves later.
