taken as long as a minute and a half. This slows down the traffic following the car attempting to park.

He also told of his observations of parking attempts by motorists parking in the center of the street.

"The difficulty with parallel parking at the curb is that if the driver does not hit it exactly right his back wheel hits the curb. This lets the nose of his car just out into the flow of traffic—often slowing it down or even stopping it. Diagonal parking has no such problem. Nor is this problem as evident in the center parking zone in the middle of the street. Although some motorists back over the line painted on the street at least they get into the parking stall and there is no great harm in being a few inches over the double line between cars. However, they can't do this if they are backing into a parking spot and miss their aim a bit and run into the curb."

"I would favor one-way traffic on Sartori with diagonal parking—or maybe even center of the street parking as on Cabrillo Ave.," he suggested.

While it is common practice in some cities to have alternating streets one-way, it does not appear that such could be worked here. It would be impossible to limit traffic on Cabrillo Ave., which is the next street east of Sartori Ave., to one-way traffic.

On Cravens Ave., the next street west of Sartori Ave., one-way traffic would create considerable confusion and hazards. The fire station and the police department both are located on Cravens Ave.
