Four State Aeronautical Inspectors will be at the Torrance City Hall at 10 a.m. a week from tomorrow to hear complaints of a Lomita property owners group concerning operation of the Torrance Municipal Airport.

Airport Manager Ed Dietrich will present evidence of compliance with all aeronautical rules of safety, he said yesterday. The hearing was prompted by officials of the Lomita Property Owners and Registered Voters Assn., Inc., who have complained vigorously to state officials despite several other hearings which have given the airport a clean bill of health.

A previous hearing, presided over by B. M. Doolin, director of State Aeronautics, ended with Doolin saying the airport was one of the most safely operated facilities in the state.

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Injunction Issued Limiting Edison Company Pickets

A preliminary injunction limiting International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers picketing activities against Southern California Edison Company and banning Union threats to non-striking employees and picketing of their homes, has been issued in Superior Court by Judge Frank C. Swain.

On Monday, April 6, company and union representatives appeared before Judge Swain, in response to the Court's order to the union to show cause why the preliminary injunction should not be granted. The injunction continues the prohibitions of the temporary restraining order issued March 27.

All picketing within 200 yards of transmission, distribution and communication lines, poles, towers, and service trucks, are going to or from a job site is prohibited. The temporary injunction also prohibits all picketing at the company's business offices, plants, sub-stations and other facilities unless pickets march not less than 20 feet apart, except when passing.

Picketing of employees' homes is forbidden. Pickets or other persons are enjoined from endangering persons or destroying property, intimidating or threatening employees and other persons doing business with the company, and using loud and obscene language.

Picketing of employees' homes or carrying banners in the vicinity of employees' homes is expressly prohibited, and strikers also are restrained from following employees or members of their families by automobile or otherwise.

Included in the injunction are prohibitions against intimidating, threatening, molesting, assaulting, or coercing company employees, representatives, or persons doing business with the company. Inducing or attempting to cause by word or act, any fear of reprisal, physical molestation, or other injury to employees, representatives or persons doing business with the company also is prohibited.

Rogers, a retired car inspector, had lived in Torrance for six months. Councilmen from the even-numbered districts must stand for election in two years. After that, half of the council will stand for re-election every two years.
