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State Aeronautical Commission Hears Complaints of Low-Flying

(Continued from Page 1) "We have no objections to the planes if they are high enough," Myers said. Mrs. Lillian Cameron, of 1936 Lomita Blvd., said her home is apparently located outside of the landing pattern, but that planes fly over her house so low that they have to get more elevation in order to get to the airport.

**Crashes Listed** Mrs. Lena Wells, of 2426 W. 251st St., said she had lived in Lomita for 32 years and knew of many crashes. She then listed the crashes that had occurred at or near the field since it was opened during the war. She also said the planes flew so low that oil and grease splattered over her laundry hanging on the clothesline.

**Roof-top View** Malcolm Cameron, of 1936 Lomita Blvd., told the group that his rooftop afforded him a good view of the airport. It was his contention that the small planes go in to the field by staying west of Pennsylvania Ave.

**Saw No Violations** Captain Pinckney, who lives in Palos Verdes Estates, said it was his experience at the field that the airport manager, Dietrich, had been "really working on the fellows to stay in as

tight a pattern as possible" when landing. Pinckney reported that he had observed no violations and that none had been reported to him. Sgt. Ray Uzelac, of the Sheriff's Aero Detail, said it was common to hear pilots at other fields in the area say that Torrance was so strict that they didn't want to fly in here.

**Uzelac said Capt. Sewell Griggers, head of the Aero Detail, has recommended that the first turn-off from the landing strip be eliminated and that landing short of the runway be halted.**

**Dietrich informed the group that he had put a stop to the practice of some student-pilots of landing in the dirt ahead of the paved runway.**

**The hearing ended at the end of a five-hour session with Chairman Turner instructing Aero-nautics Director Doolin to prepare and mail a letter to all fields explaining the problem at Torrance and asking that pilots coming in to the field adhere to the pattern as tight as possible.**

**"For the first time we feel that we have had a decent hearing where there was no free-for-all," Mrs. Phillips said after the meeting.**

**Mrs. Irv Lowellen, of 2015 W. 250th St., asked the commission to sponsor legislation to call for compulsory liability and property damage insurance. In response to a question from one of the Commissioners she said she had never noticed any oil or grease as was mentioned by Mrs. Wells.**
