Sign-ups for Camp Tahquitz Meadows, the YWCA camp for teen-age girls near Idyllwild, opened this week. This year the camp will offer nine one-week periods from June 29 to Aug. 31, Mrs. Otis S. Blackstone, publicity chairman, said. Every session will include horseback riding, swimming, water ballet, volleyball, tennis, baseball, hikes, cook-outs, starlight symphonies, and worship, as well as opportunities to make new friends, she added.

The camp fee includes room, board, and registration fee as well as insurance, covering personal sickness, accidents, and polo. Optional costs include horseback riding, craft materials, and supplies purchased at the camp store.

All girls from the seventh through the twelfth grade are eligible. Each girl may remain in camp for a maximum of three one-week sessions.
