The Rev. John Taylor, of the First Methodist Church, will conduct funeral services this afternoon at Stone and Myers Mortuary for Carlisle A. Peek, 63, who died Monday in Bakersfield, Calif.

Peek was a resident of Torrance for 14 years, and worked at National Supply Co. A group of fellow workers will serve as his pallbearers.

Interment at Westminster Memorial Park will follow the final rites. The deceased is survived by his widow, Nela Rae Peek, of 1507 Cota Ave.; two sons, C. A. Peek, of Manhattan Beach, and Jack Baker of Venice; two daughters, Mrs. Eddie Greer, Long Beach, and Mrs. John Keith, Torrance; and a brother, George, of Long Beach.

Receiving painful head and face lacerations, a possible cracked rib, and deep cuts under her right knee when a car in which she was riding Tuesday evening collided with another on Torrance Blvd., Mrs. Mona Goettsch, wife of Marvin Goettsch, president of the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce, and until Tuesday a member of the Torrance Recreation Commission.

Mrs. Goettsch, who lives at 2266 Torrance Blvd., was a passenger in a car driven by Winfred Yancey, of 684 Sartori Ave., when it was struck by an auto driven by 14-year-old Gilbert Monson, of 1021 1/2 Washington Blvd., Los Angeles, on Torrance Blvd. near Earl St.

Following treatment for her injuries at Harbor General Hospital, Mrs. Goettsch was released to her home.

Officers of the California Highway Patrol are investigating the crash.

McNally Hits 'Hole' After Prison Riot

William McNally, involved in the \$20,000 National Supply Co. robbery here, has been thrown into the "hole" at the Los Angeles county jail after being nabbed as one of the ringleaders in an inmate riot at the jail Saturday night.

Don Madlung, also implicated in the robbery, is out on \$5000 bail, and is scheduled to appear for trial on June 23 in Los Angeles Superior Court, police said this week. The third member of the robbery trio is still at large.

Driver Pleads Not Guilty In Traffic Death

Richard G. Lenk, 21, of Hawthorne, pleaded not guilty Tuesday to a charge of manslaughter growing out of a two-car smashup which resulted in the death of Mrs. Joanne T. Flynn, a Hollywood Riviera housewife, and her unborn child, on May 8.

Clement D. Nye, Los Angeles Superior Judge, ordered Lenk to appear for trial on July 28, before Superior Judge David Coleman. He is free on \$1000 bail pending the trial.

Lenk's car crashed head-on into another car being driven by Mrs. Flynn's husband and occupied by another couple besides the Flymns. Mrs. Flynn died five hours after the accident. Police said Lenk admitted having been drinking at a party prior to the crash.

Santa Fe Making Ground Survey

Surveyors currently staking out the area north of Torrance Gardens are only making a ground survey, a spokesman of the Santa Fe Railway, owners of the property, said Monday.

He stated there are no plans at the moment which would indicate that a new industry was being planned for the location. Homeowners on Maricopa Ave. east of Cromwell Blvd. and other residents of the area have asked the City Council to rezone the property from its present designation of M-1, which allows for heavy manufacturing, to R-1, which allows only single-family residences to be erected on the land.

Goettsch Leaves Recreation Body

Resignation of Marvin Goettsch, senior member of the city's Recreation Commission, was accepted by the City Council here Tuesday evening after Goettsch submitted a written request to be relieved of the post on June 8.

Goettsch, who was a holdover member of the Commission which served before the recent revamping of the advisory group, is president of the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The resignation request offered no reason for Goettsch's action, and he said yesterday that he had no statement to make on the matter.

He is retail sales manager of Mayfair Creamery.

School Sets Date Of Registration

Kindergarten registration at Haldale Avenue School has been set for June 22 through 30, according to Mrs. Amanda Bonwell, principal of the school.

Hours of registration will be 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and children must be five years old on or before Dec. 1, 1953, to qualify, and must bring legal proof of their birth date.

The Haldale school will close on June 19, after a half day of classes. Mrs. Bonwell said. Total registration at the school totals 1018 students, with 29 teachers.

Following the close of school, Mrs. Bonwell plans to attend a National Educational Association convention in Miami Beach, Fla., where she will help boost Rex Turner, assistant superintendent of schools in Oakland, for the position of president of the association.

Check Passing Suspect Tells Local Crimes

Det. Sgt. Percy Bennett of the Torrance police asked local merchants to inspect their bad check piles this week for checks drawn on the Bank of America or the Security First National Bank and signed Hugo John Holt.

Holt, 33, is now in custody in Glendale, and has admitted passing bad checks at large grocery stores in Torrance, police said. He signs them with his true name and always makes them out for \$10, according to police reports.

Holt is described as a stocky, dark complexioned, Caucasian with brown hair, blue eyes, and thick-lensed glasses. Any local merchants holding any of his checks are asked to notify Sgt. Bennett right away.

Local Suspect Surrenders, Is Arraigned Here

A local auto theft and bad check suspect, who surrendered to police in San Diego earlier this week, was arraigned yesterday morning in Judge John Shidler's Municipal Court and a preliminary hearing was set for June 16 at South Bay Municipal Court.

Barnet Eugene Penrod, 26, who gave his address as the Torrance Hotel, was arraigned on charges of grand theft auto, five bad check counts, and on traffic violations.

Penrod was accused of stealing an auto belonging to Albin C. Michels, then passing eight or nine checks in amounts ranging from \$1.50 to \$10, and driving to San Diego. In San Diego, Penrod presumably decided he was in big trouble, went to the police and surrendered.

Assistant Chief of Police Willard Haslam went down and brought the suspect back to Torrance. At present, Penrod is incarcerated in the county jail.

With him in Japan for the last 12 months of his duty there, were his wife Patricia, his daughters Helen Carol, 5, and Sheila, 4, and son Paul, 2. The Hallorans also brought back from overseas a new addition to the family, Mark, six weeks old, who was born at the Hallorans' Tokyo home.

After a four-months course in anesthesiology at White Memorial Hospital, Halloran plans to return to medical practice with Dr. John Beaman and Clifford E. Basley, at the Torrance Medical Center, in November.

Halloran is also a veteran of World War II, having spent 25 months in the service during that conflict.

Edison Company Seeks Rate Hike

A three-day hearing on the petition of Southern California Edison Co. for an increase in rates which would boost annual income by \$16,000,000 opened yesterday before the State Public Utilities Commission in Los Angeles.

If allowed by the commission, the boost would add about 25 cents a month to the average household's bill and would hike commercial users' bills by about \$1.15 a month.
