Director Charles A. Gault said that more than 19,000 members of the temple and thousands of visitors attended the impressive ceremonies. The rites started at 8 p.m. and were followed by an Arabic feast. The mystic rites of the second section which included induction of candidates, followed the feast.

Arch L. Field, potentate, hosted delegates from as far away as Mexico City and Honolulu.

Edison Hearing Recessed; Will Reopen July 16

Hearings by the State Public Utilities Commission regarding the So. Calif. Edison Company's request for a rate hike have been recessed until July 15 and 16 at which time the hearing will be reopened in Visalia.

The commission will reopen

hearings in Los Angeles on July 22 to 24 and again on September 16 to 18 for cross-examination of previous witnesses.

Harold Quinton, executive vice-president of the company, told the commissioners, "Edison's customers are today paying the

company fewer 50-cent dollars than they paid in 90-cent and 100-cent dollars in the thirties."

"From the standpoint of employees," the executive stated, "the purchasing power of wages has kept pace with inflation. From the standpoint of custom-

ers, they are receiving the same or better service for which they pay us fewer 50-cent dollars today than they paid us 90-cent and 100-cent dollars 20 years ago."

Quinton said, "There must be some recognition and correction of the effect of inflation on the stockholders of the company." He told the commission the proposed increase would boost

the average domestic consumer's electric service bill about 25 cents a month.

The company is applying for rate increases that would total about 16 million dollars a year.
