# Schedule of Visits For Free X-Ray Told

Visits of the tax-supported Mobile Chest X-Ray unit of the Los Angeles County Health Department in the Torrance area have been scheduled throughout July, August, September, and October, it was announced recently.

The unit will be in East Torrance, Harbor City, and Lomita during July, in central Torrance during August, and back in central Torrance in October. During September, the unit will be in the Beach cities.

Dr. G. A. Heldbreder, district health officer, expressed the hope that more persons will take advantage of the free chest x-ray offers this year. He pointed out that the x-ray may show abnormalities of the chest such

as tumors or enlarged hearts as well as tuberculosis.

Anyone over 15 years of age may obtain a chest x-ray. However, children between the ages of 15 and 18 should be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Local organizations represented by the Citizens Advisory Committee of the Torrance Health District, will assist in the mobile chest x-ray survey, according to County Health Officer Roy O. Gilbert.
