Mrs. Grow will be working under Mrs. William Stanton, member of the National Board of the California YWCA, who has been named state representative for the American Observance and Centennial Celebration.

Mrs. Stanton will represent Southern California members of the YWCA on the national Centennial Community Organization headed by Mrs. Arthur Forrest Anderson of New York City, past president of the YWCA of the United States.

"The YWCA was founded in England in 1855 and today is at work in 66 countries," Mrs. Halfpenny said.

"The three-point Centennial program in this country," she continued, "will be celebrated throughout the American YWCA's three million membership in a spirit of rededication to the principles for which the YWCA stands."

Program goals are a membership increase of 600,000 women and girls over the next two years, and a raise in capital funds of \$5,000,000 in birthday gifts from members and friends to strengthen national program and services to 440 community YWCAs and student organizations on 640 college and university campuses.
