

Roy, THS End, Drops Warrior Football

El Camino football mentors this week were bemoaning the loss of Larry Roy, stellar end for Torrance High School last year, who was forced to drop from football and from school at El Camino because of a lack of high school units. Roy reportedly plans to make up the deficiencies in summer school and return to the Warriors next year. Former Torrance High grads still on hand to bolster the El Camino grid hopes this year include six freshmen, five of them from the '52 Tartar team, and three of last year's championship El Camino team. Up from the '52 Tartars are Jim Farrar, top-flight quarterback for Torrance last year, whose brother, Jerry, will play end for the Tartars this year; Ted Marcoux, captain of the local gridders last year, who works from a halfback or cen-

ter spot; Dan Mayers, rough Tartar center; Jim O'Hara, a tackle for the '52 Tartars who is out for end at El Camino, and Tom Smith, a tackle, who plans to bolster the Warrior line from that position this season. Back from the service is Gil Avalos, who played end for the Tartar team in 1947 and is a freshman at El Camino this year. Longren Aircraft Co. has agreed to donate trophies to the outstanding lineman and backfield man on the Alumni squad, which will meet the Warrior varsity on Sept. 19 at 8 p.m. A board of judges from local newspapers will choose the out-

standing players and the trophies will be presented after the game. Leading the Warrior grads from the fullback slot will be Dick Turner, veteran of Torrance High grid play, and a grad of El Camino and of College of Idaho. El Camino Coaches Norm Verry, Amby Schindler, and Doug Essick are busy this week shaping and sculpting their gang of gridders in preparation for the season's opening game.
