

Mimi, Dwarf Cow, Soon to Be Mama

At first they thought "Mimi" had eaten too much green alfalfa because she was getting as round as a butterball. "Mimi" is a pint-sized Hereford cow that just got too lazy to grow after she got to be 36 inches high. But now they know that the dwarf cow is about to "mamaize"—and any day now. "Mami" gets her fair share of attention from Billy Walsh, four-year-old future cow boy whose father, "Bud" Walsh owns the 190th St. Stock Auction yard where "Mimi" lives. The little cow stands no higher than a yardstick and weighs but 650 pounds as compared with the 1400 pounds—the average weight for a full-grown Hereford. D. C. Cook, part owner of the undersized cow, says "Mimi" is normal in most all other ways and has a set of 13-inch horns to prove it. "She just quit growing too soon," says Cook. He expects "Mimi's" first offspring to be a normal-sized calf and develop into a full-weight cow.

Girls Nix Mass Showering Plan



"... maybe I'm just modest, but taking a shower in front of all those other girls would simply embarrass me to tears!"

The Board of Education may find itself in hot water this week because there are no doors on the girls showers at Torrance High School.

A group of freshman girls threatened to rebel at taking mass showers, but called off the revolution when they became fearful of the disciplinary consequences should they balk at taking showers in masse.

A father of one of the girls who said he represented a "group" of parents, claimed that private shower stalls should be available for those girls who wished to shower in privacy.

"It isn't like physical education was an elective course. All girls have to take gym. If they decided to take physical education and objected to mass showers they could drop the course. But PE is a must course and all the girls have to take showers," he said.

Meanwhile Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, said that the trend in gymnasium design was "toward mass shower facilities."

The local gym was remodeled during the summer to remove some dangerous steps in the shower room, to resurface the shower room floor and to remove some partitions which the girls physical education instructors labeled as "hazards."

The school superintendent stated that the remodeling was necessitated by a tremendous influx of students at Torrance High. Previously there was one shower head where there are six at present. With the increased enrollment many girls would not have been able to take showers in the time allotted between classes due to the inadequate number of shower heads. Dr. Hull stated that under the new management all girls who wish to take showers after gym class can do so.

He said that there are three "private" showers available for those girls who wish privacy when showering. One of the complaining parents, informed of this statement, "That is hardly adequate for the number of girls who would want to take showers in private."

Walteria Crash Victim Suffers Severe Injuries

A Walteria man was fighting for his life today after he was injured in an auto accident in which a San Pedro man was killed early Saturday morning on Western Ave. near Green Hills Memorial Park.

Harold Mevert, 37, of 3112 Winlock Dr., Walteria, is in San Pedro Community Hospital suffering severe internal and chest injuries, a concussion, and a broken leg.

Dead is Vincent Corsale, driver of the second car, who just had turned 21 three days ago. He resided at 1268 W. 26th St., San Pedro.

Mevert, a longshoreman, was returning from work in San Pedro at the time of the accident. The force of the impact jammed his left leg in the car and kept him from being thrown clear, patrolmen said. Officers had to dig Mevert out of the wreckage.

Members of the California Highway Patrol said that they could not determine the direction in which the cars were traveling when they hit, but that it seemed that they were headed in opposite directions and met almost head-on.

Mevert's wife, BeBe Mevert, is employed in a Palos Verdes drug store. They have no children.

New Real Estate Course Designed To Aid Salesmen

Real Estate Selling, a course designed to improve the selling technique of local real estate salesmen and brokers, is to be taught at the Torrance High School of Adult Education, 2200 W. Carson St., beginning Wednesday, Sept. 23, according to Howard Perry, president of the Torrance-Lomita Realty Board which is sponsoring the course.

The course is to be taught by Walter Eliason, who is affiliated with the U. S. Department of Commerce and who is active in the educational program of the Real Estate Association. The instructor was formerly State Director of Distributive Education for Montana and Utah. He has many years experience in the sales and real estate fields.

Dale Isenberg, executive secretary of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce which is cooperating with the Adult School of Education in presenting this course, will act as moderator. The course is a six-week class to be held Wednesday evenings in the high school cafeteria.

This course is planned to meet the sales problems experienced by the real estate agent or broker. Topics to be considered are: Knowing your city; Finding prospects for your property; Sources of prospects; Opening the sale; Planned, not canned, sales talks; Answering and overcoming objections; Closing the sale; How to make customers believe you; and Sales psychology.

Torrance YMCA Boys and Girls To Attend Y-Day

More than 50 YMCAs from California, Arizona and Nevada will be represented.

For the sixth straight year TV Star Art Linkletter will be the emcee and organizer of the variety show.

Stan Roberts said last year more than 90 Torrance youngsters attended and "had the time of their lives."

"We consider Y-Day an important part of our fall program and hope to have more local folks represented, this year than ever before."

He added that the Hollywood Bowl show will feature movie, television and radio stars. As in past years, it is expected that it will be broadcast coast to coast on a major radio network.

2 Raiders Get 180 Day Jolts, Trial for Rest

Receiving 180-day sentences in county jail Friday morning were two adult members of a gang of 22 San Pedro youths who attacked a wedding party at the American Legion Hall last Saturday with bottles, bullets and rocks.

The pair, Paul Jimenez and Raymond Feliciano, pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace charges. Five other adult members of the gang pleaded not guilty and are scheduled for trial in South Bay Municipal Court Friday.

A swarm of 15 juveniles who were also involved in the melee were taken, with their parents, before Sgt. D. C. Cook, Torrance juvenile officer, for a juvenile hearing yesterday morning.

Sgt. Cook certified all of the juveniles to the Juvenile Court in Los Angeles, which will make the disposition on the case, and mete out the sentences. The juveniles will be notified by the probation office as to when they are to appear.

Judge Otto B. Willitt sentenced Feliciano to 180 days with one day suspended, and Judge John Shidler sentenced Jimenez (Continued on Page 9)
