Free X-Ray Unit Here This Week For Three Days

The mobile chest X-ray unit, On Thursday, Oct. 8, the unit Health Department will be in Torrance again this week on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. On Wednesday, Oct. 7, the unit will be in front of the Safeway Store at Saylor and El Prado from 10 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. On Thursday, Oct. 8, the unit will be at the Safeway store from 1:30 p.m. until 7 p.m. On Friday, Oct. 9, the unit will be at the Jim Dandy Market, Crenshaw and Torrance Blvd. from 10 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Every person 15 years and over should have a chest X-ray at least once a year, health officials advise. X-rays will not be made of children under 15 as tuberculosis is primarily a disease of adults and is uncommon in the age group under 15 years. A parent or legal guardian should accompany all children between the ages of 15 and 18 years. Members of the Torrance Jayettes under the chairmanship of Mrs. Joseph P. Bay, will sponsor the survey and act as hostesses.
