

Budding entertainers from the Torrance Area YMCA are being invited to enter a talent competition to be held in connection with Y-Day in Hollywood which an expected 150 local youngsters and adults will attend Oct. 31. Secretary Stan Roberts announced yesterday.

Entrants from more than 50 California YMCAs will compete before the big variety show audience in Hollywood Bowl. Also on the program for the all-day event is the UCLA-California football game.

Winner of the talent contest will receive a valuable prize and the YMCA branch he represents will be awarded a television set.

Slated for the Y-Day variety show, which Art Linkletter will emcee, are stars of movies, television, and radio.

Roberts said he expects attendance from the Torrance area to top previous years by a wide margin. Last year 91 local youngsters and adults attended. Y-Day in Hollywood is the biggest single YMCA event in the world.

He added that entry blanks for the talent contest can be obtained at the YMCA.

Reservations for Y-Day in Hollywood are now available at the Torrance "Y." Cost, which includes transportation, the variety show, the football game, and a box lunch, is \$2.75.
