
TARTARS TO MEET RIVAL SEAHAWKS

Will Redondo Jinx Strike? THS Has Never Beaten RHS Here

When the Torrance Tartars meet the Redondo Seahawks tomorrow night at Tartar field, they will have to beat more than a football team. They are going to have to beat a jinx that has dogged them since the two schools first locked horns in a gridiron battle.

Torrance High School has never beaten Redondo on the Tartar field.

Shocked? Don't be. It isn't that bad. The two teams have been playing since 1947, and since that time Redondo has come to Torrance to play only twice—in 1951 and in 1949. Both times they took the measure of the Tartars, however, 7-0 and 35-6.

The bitter intercity rivalry began in 1947 when Torrance High was taken from the Los Angeles City school system and given its own school district. That year, since there were no bleachers at Tartar field, the two teams were forced to play in Redondo, and Torrance lost 35-6. Other than that first game, Redondo has never beaten Torrance on the Seahawk field. So things are evened up.

The record of the rivalry: 1947, there: Torrance 6, Redondo 33.

1949, There: Torrance 14, Redondo 7.

1949, Here: Torrance 6, Redondo 33.

1950, There: Torrance 18, Redondo 7.

1951, Here: Torrance 0, Redondo 7.

1952, There: Torrance 35, Redondo 20.

Totals: Torrance W-3 L-3.

Tomorrow night's game, ergo, will be the rubber game of the series, and the Terrifying Tartars plan to push the bulge their way.

The 1953 edition of the Seahawks may be just the team that Torrance needs to break the game jinx that has plagued both teams. But don't take the Redondans too lightly.

Redondo is the only team to have scored on powerful Inglewood all year—they boot a field goal in their 20-3 loss to the erstwhile Bay League kingpins last week.

Prior to that, the Sentinels' goal line had been unscathed by the impure cleats of a rival team.

Those who know say that Inglewood, Santa Monica, and Torrance will battle it out for the top three places in the Bay League this year, so compare the scores after Torrance plays Redondo should give some indication of the strength of the Inglewood group.

Redondo has their All-Bay League halfback, Doug Dick, back in action, but the rest of the Seahawk lineup looks like "New Faces of 1953."

Coach Cliff Graybehl says his charges are ready, and that they took last week's heart-breaking loss to Santa Monica in stride. This seems to indicate that there will be no post-loss letdown in the Tartar camp, a letdown that could mean an undesired loss at the hands of a less able team.

The Tartars, in miraculous shape, have suffered no serious injuries so far this year, after three tough ballgames. Harold "Snake" Phillip suffered a broken nose in the Samohi game, but it will not put him out of action, Graybehl says, and he will play martyr and not even wear a noseguard for tomorrow night.

The Tartars' one-two scoring punch—Burt Smith and Joe Lafferty—who have been sweeping down on rival teams like wolves on the fold, are ready to go tomorrow. Lafferty, who averaged a mean 15 yards per carry against Santa Monica, gives the Tartars the kind of backfield power that coaches only dream of.

With "Pappy" Smith running and passing, and "Go" Lafferty breaking through for long gains.
