

Torrance To Meet Baldwin Park In Non-league Tussle Tomorrow

Don Kasten, the one-man demolition team of the Torrance High School Varsity, has every right to be tired this week after his performance in the Redondo game Friday night.

Out of the 54 times that Tartar backs carried the ball on rushing plays, Don carried it 30 times. Out of 184 net yards gained rushing, Don gained 106. He also scored 18 out of 34 points. And he did it all inside of tackle, according to Tartar Coach Dick Leech.

The Tartars capitalized on the weak center of the Seahawk line and, with Ralph Clifford, Mike Jackson, Bob McCutchen, Richard Cosgrove and Ed Powell clearing the way, Kasten

wore a deep rut down the center of the turf.

The locals met in a non-league tomorrow night on the home field when Baldwin Park High School comes to town. Baldwin Park, coached by Bob Musick of the USC Musicks, is a fairly new school, having been established in the San Gabriel Valley for three years now. They have 1450 students. Running off a split T, similar to the type of formation used by Lynnwood, the Braves are definitely a passing team, and the Tartars, realizing their shortcomings in aerial defense, have been working this week on pass thwarting.

In their first year in the San Gabriel Valley League, Baldwin Park has won one and lost three (thus far).

They were edged by Mira Costa 14-13; they lost to Hawthorne 47-20; they fell before Pasadena 20-6; and, in their first league game, scored a 38-20 win over Bell Gardens, which was supposed to be the scourge of the loop.

Obviously, the Braves have no trouble scoring points. The Tartars' behemoth line, however, gave up the startling total of three (3) yards to Redondo on the ground Friday night, their best defensive effort of the year.

The Torrance forward wall would not be cooled with a tail. Redondo gained 35 rushing, and lost 32.

This seems to give the locals the edge as far as ground warfare goes. But the Braves have a quarterback named Jim Conroy who just loves to throw that ball. Redondo gained all of their yards through the air—102 yards. Santa Monica gained 162 yards and two TDs on passes. Need we say more?

The Baldwin Park team has 14 returning lettermen from a team that freelaunched for two wins, three losses and one tie last year. Six of these lettermen are first-stringers. The Braves are light, but fast, and have a couple of half-backs named Roger Tremblay and Al Sweet who supposedly can move the ball when called upon to do so.
