

### AUXILIARY AIDS FIREMEN


Women of the newly-formed Ladies Auxiliary of the Torrance Fire Department will tell you that other cities all over California have had similar groups for a long time, and if the local group was installed only last December, it intends to make up for lost time by taking part in all possible city activities and charities in the future.

Officers of the Torrance unit are Mesdames Roy Flagg, president; Bill Russell, first vice-president; Walter West, second vice-president; Don Minor, secretary; and Don Davis, treasurer.

Under their leadership, the auxiliary has organized a mobile canteen to provide food, coffee, and dry goods to firemen battling blazes for long hours. The group also sponsored cake sales and sold shampoos to raise the \$50 contributed to the school children's Dental Health Clinic, as well as giving potluck suppers for children.

On Sept. 7, with the Compton Auxiliary members as guests, the local "Fireladies" presented a fashion show featuring smart fall garments from Mari Lynn Dress Shop.

The women meet the first Monday of each month at the Master Hall and include on their agenda the selection of delegates, and dry goods to attend the State Firemen's Conventions.



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### Riviera PTA In Second Year

It was with a feeling of accomplishment and a sense of a job well done that Riviera Elementary School PTA started on its second year Sept. 14, 1953.

Back in 1949, the need for a school in the Riviera was first felt by Torrance school authorities, who spoke then of building another school there as a registered nurse in charge of supplying nurses 24 hours a day at no cost to the public. That same year, the San Pedro General Hospital was built at 1305 W. Sixth St. The members of the District volunteered many hours of labor folding dressings, sewing muslin strips on rubber sheets, and performing other hospital tasks, including the embroidering of tiny blue storks on pillow cases in the nursery.

The name of the Registry was changed in 1936 to "Bureau of Nursing Service," under which all official registries in this state managed by registered nurses were known at that time. Also that year the eight-hour day was inaugurated. Hourly nursing went into practical working in 1937, making it possible for the sick to have professional nursing care at a minimum cost.

During the second World War, five casualty stations were set up under the direction of Civil Defense. In 1949, District 21 was honored when it became the first of the State Association of the CSNA Group Sickness and Accident Insurance Plan.

Nurses in Torrance, Harbor City, and the Palos Verdes area as well as San Pedro are now included in this organization, the name being changed from "Bureau of Nursing Service" in 1951 to Harbor Area Nurses Association. A series of five classes in disaster nursing was given in October, 1951, at Harbor General Hospital, and instruction was given in new treatments for burns from an atom bomb blast, treatments for atom bomb radiation sickness, poison gases, and germ warfare. A committee in Nursing Resources was established, and most of the nurses in the harbor area have their names on file with the association chairman and with the office of Civil Defense.

In August, 1952, the first Nurses Institute was held at Harbor Junior College. The latest in modern medicine, techniques and procedures, was demonstrated.

This year as previously, the association has raised funds in various ways. There have been card parties, pot-luck dinners, and the annual waffle breakfast. A fall masquerade ball will be held Oct. 30 at the Portuguese Bend Club, and the public is invited to purchase tickets from nurses at San Pedro or Harbor General hospitals. Prizes will be awarded for the best costumes and Sid Zaid's orchestra will provide the music.

The proceeds from these affairs go to the Student Nurse Fund to help young nurses through their three-year course. The association meets the second Wednesday of each month in the staff room at San Pedro Community Hospital and all registered nurses in this area are invited.

Pearce, nursing resources; Virginia Backlund, credentials; McAlary, education; Mary Bolch, hospitality; Donella Drazkowski, ways and means; Shirley Neal, historian; Margaret Doherty, public relations; Regan, private duty section; and Ellen Triner, general duty section.

Directors are Rose Smith, Margaret Feuille, and Frances Scott.

The importance of our nurses and their organization cannot be overestimated in these war-torn and perilous times. Trained to aid in Civil Defense, they also are on constant call for duty in regular peacetime years.

A local "Graduate Nurses' Club" organized in 1924 with 35 members obtained a charter and was accepted into membership of the California State Nurses' Association, District 21. The following year in May, the Nurses' Central Registry was opened in San Pedro in a private home with a registered nurse in charge.

The Songdusters, a group of 18 musically inclined women, began to meet in 1946 as a PTA chorus and were known as the "Orange Street Singers" until 1950. They appeared in many lodges, clubs and hospitals in Southern California offering special acts and concert programs. Some of the earlier shows presented were "The Forty-Niners," "Gas Lights Revue" and "Holiday."

Withdrawing from the PTA in 1950, the women became affiliated with the San Pedro Woman's Club. In 1952 they presented "Harbor O'Lights," the spring of 1953 gave "Capt. Rogers Showboat."

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In May this year they became an independent group known as the Songdusters, self supporting and deriving expenses for director and music from proceeds of benefit shows.

Roger Bushell of Manhattan Beach, who is well known in musical circles, is the director. Mrs. H. V. Blakesley, one-time concert mistress and violin soloist with the South Bay Civic orchestra, is accompanist. She is also accompanist for the adult education chorus at Harbor Junior College.

The officers of "Songdusters" are Stella Kellogg of Lomita, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. W. W. Howe, hostess co-ordinator and Robert Hultz, publicity.

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

A "Learn to Swim" campaign is conducted each year by the Lions during Easter vacation at the pools in San Pedro. The club pays for the transportation of youngsters to the pools, but no boy able to swim can participate.

Other projects include sponsoring of a group of boys at a uses. Alcoholics Anonymous has used the clubrooms for three years past and meets each Friday evening at 8 p.m.

The Well Babies Clinic, under the supervision of a doctor and nurse, is given the use of the clubhouse twice a month. For the past two years, the Church of Christ has also met in the club rooms.

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
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
