Fatalities in Traffic Headed For Record Low

As California highway users head into the final months of 1953 they face the job of protecting a record low mileage death rate for highway travel.
The rate, currently 6.4, represents traffic fatalities per one hundred million miles of travel, and is the lowest since statistics have been kept on accidents. This announcement was released from Headquarters of the California Highway Patrol today.
Fatalities throughout the state through September this year. The total was 2563 for the same interval.
"We are headed in the right direction, but there's plenty of hard work yet to be done," stated Highway Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell in commenting on this downward trend.
"There will be bad driving weather during November and December, there will be more hours of darkness, and there will be far too many automobiles driven in spite of faulty equipment.
"We can reduce last year's accident total, but we will take the best efforts of each of us. Keep your car in safe condition and keep yourself fit to drive; then drive safely," he urged.
Fatalities in unincorporated areas of the state number 1780, 73 fewer than for the first nine months of 1952. Reportable accidents and injuries on rural roadways show similar reductions when compared to similar periods last year.

During the reporting period which ended Oct. 10, Mrs. Ellis reported a total of 382 Torrance residents seeking work through the office.
As of Nov. 10, 443 persons were seeking jobs, the manager reported.
Increases were noted in all classifications except professional and labor, the report showed.
Of the 443 residents looking for jobs here, 213 were women and 230 were men. Mrs. Ellis reported. Forty-six per cent of the men were veterans, a few of them disabled.
