Dr. Frank Baxter To Address Grads

Dr. Frank C. Baxter, noted "Shakespeare on TV" artist, will address 1954 graduates of El Camino College at exercises to be conducted at the El Camino football stadium at 4 p.m. June 18.

Announcement of Dr. Baxter's acceptance of El Camino's invitation to speak at commencement exercises was made this week by President Forrest G. Murdock, who invited the public to attend.

In addition to his work on television, Dr. Baxter is widely known for his work as professor of English at the University of Southern California, where he is a teacher and lecturer on the literature of England and America. He is particularly known for his work on Shakespeare, the history of humor, and the history of books and printing.

Broad Background

Dr. Baxter has an extensive American and European educational background. His undergraduate work was completed at the University of Pennsylvania,

where he was graduated summa cum laude in 1923. His doctorate is from the University of Cambridge, England, where he was a member of Trinity College.

Formerly associated with the faculties of the University of Pennsylvania, Swarthmore College, and the University of California, Dr. Baxter served in the Army Medical Corps in the AEF during World War I. He is a former president of the USC chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, and was the first chairman of the SC Senate.

Hobbies Told

Dr. Baxter's hobbies include reading, book collecting, and the designing and making of models and charts to illustrate the history of human records and the history of the theater. Accounts of two of these models have appeared in national magazines—a working model of a printing press used in about 1500, and another of Shakespeare's Globe Theater. Most of the visual materials used on his television program have been made by him.

Dr. Baxter appears frequently before scholarship societies and professional honorary fraternities; he addresses many teachers' institutes each year. He is particularly well-known throughout Southern California for his traditional readings of Christmas prose and verse given annually on the SC campus. These were for several years sent overseas by Armed Forces Radio; in 1953 they were televised.

Listed "Most Popular" in its "Education Number," Life magazine listed Dr. Baxter among the eight most popular university professors in the United States.

The USC professor initiated "Shakespeare on TV," the first college course to be taught on TV for academic credit in Southern California. The program attracted 332 persons for credit, 885 for audit, 15 in the TV studio classroom, and a home audience in the thousands during the first semester session. Registration was even higher for the second course, which terminated Saturday.

Civil Defense Officials Favor Federal Department

Legislation proposed by Congressman Cecil R. King to make the Federal Civil Defense Administration an executive department with its secretary given membership in the National Security Council has received the approval and support of Los Angeles Civil Defense Director Colonel Richard F. Lynch.

"The need for dissemination of vital information in the development of atomic energy and its application to warfare is particularly pressing at the municipal level," Col Lynch stated.

A Joint Resolution

Introduced by Congressman King last April in the House of Representatives, the Joint Resolution (H. J. R. 503) calls on President Eisenhower to use his organizational powers to give executive department status to the Federal Civil Defense Administration so that an effective civilian defense program can be established "to cope with the danger of enemy attack."

The resolution also gives backing to the President's program of "pooling with other friendly nations atomic energy information for peaceful purposes." Action on the measure is now pending by the House Committee of Government Operations.

Lynch in Accord

After reviewing the proposed legislation, Col. Lynch told Congressman King that he was "completely in accord" with the measure, and said:

"I believe that your resolution would strengthen the ability of vital centers of population in the United States to prepare adequate plans for the protection of our citizens."

Robert C. Kirkwood, state controller, this week distributed \$1,280,351.15 to Los Angeles County as its share of the County as its share of the Highway Users Tax available for apportionment to counties for the month ended April 30, 1954.

Varied Types Make Up Second Class of Evening High School

A French War Bride from Casablanca . . . veterans of the war . . . housewives—many and varied are the types of people who form the second gradant class of the Torrance Evening High School.

The class of 40-16 women and 24 men—will be graduated at the same time as the Class of '54 at Torrance High School. Diplomas will be given out tonight at 8:15 o'clock on the high school football field by Dr. Marshall R. Crawshaw, principal of the evening school.

Like most of the evening school's 1200 students, all of the graduates were employed or cared for their families during the day and attended school only in the evening. They took advantage of regular academic and shop courses designed to enable adult students to complete high school graduation requirements in minimum time.

Ten Vets Included

Included in the group are ten veterans, one a woman, all of whom passed tests enabling them to meet high school requirements; six housewives and 10 regularly employed women; a French war bride from Casablanca, Morocco, who plans to continue on through college and become a teacher; and one young man who plans to give up his thriving business and attend college to study chiropody.

More than half of the members of the class are married and parents. Many of them are completing their high school education after an interim of up to 20 years.

Flag Day will be observed with ceremonies at Normandale Play ground, 1826 W. 224th St., at 4 p.m. on June 14.

A resolution introduced to the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County proclaims Flag Day in the following way:

WHEREAS, the Flag of the United States of America is a beautiful symbol of the sacrifices and hardships endured by our founding fathers and countless thousands down through the years since the birth of our nation; and

WHEREAS, "Old Glory" represents to all the world the liberties which constitute the hard-earned heritage of free men and

WHEREAS, love of country and respect for the Flag of the United States of America is the beginning of all civic virtues.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles designate June 14, 1954 as American Flag Day and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each home should have the Flag of the United States and display it on June 14, 1954, and that those not having a flag be urged to obtain one so that we all may renew our appreciation for all that our country and its Flag, means to us.
