problem; the former helps him to feel understanding and warmth, but at the same time to look more constructively at what is bothering him.

If this were not the case I fear I would sit down and have a good cry with all of my clients, or pat them on the shoulder with "you poor thing, how can that big brute do that to you?" which of course would do nothing to help them face their conflicts in life but would only channelize their feelings of self pity that much more strongly.

OBJECTIVE ATTITUDE NEEDED This is often why "talking things over" with the neighbors, your mother, or an old chum is not advisable. These persons are not able in most cases to provide the proper attitude to really help you understand yourself; they take sides or try to talk you out of the way you feel, tell you it's silly, or you shouldn't let it bother you, etc.

They unconsciously have what we call emotional bias, which is not helpful to a person with a problem. On the other hand, they often consciously have our best interests at heart and are well-meaning.

The counselor has been trained to give empathy, to cultivate an objective attitude, so that he can better help the client to help himself. Plus the fact that he has undergone intensive therapy to insure emotional stability and maturity, as well as resolved his basic conflicts in life.

We never get to the place in which we never have a problem situation; however, the way in which we meet these situations is influenced by how much unresolved childhood residue of conflict we may have.

I'll continue this discussion next week.

## Lovely Hotels, Warm Sea, Dashing Styles Impress Herald Scribe on Florida Visit

Miami Beach, Fla. once closed doors to summer visitors and waited for the winter season, but the beautiful resort city is now a summer paradise for the vacationer or convention delegate, as the case may be.

I was one of hundreds from all over the United States and Canada to attend the Pi Beta Phi convention, held at the Roney Plaza Hotel in the Floridian city. Although meetings, speakers and sorority business were uppermost on the agenda, impressions of Miami Beach were vivid.

HOTELS BEAUTIFUL Gleaming white hotels line the clean beach in Miami, all beautiful, modern structures with gardens and tropical flowers, surrounding them. There are over 400 hotels in the area . . . not counting motels, apartment houses, and other living accommodations. A tourist's first impression of Miami Beach is one of amazement, driving over the lush-lined causeways, gazing at man-made lagoons on either side, and watching sparkling reflections of the sun caught by Miami's skyline in the distance.

California beaches differ from the Floridian variety. There is no surf to speak of, but small waves, no bigger than at Lake Arrowhead, glide over the feet of the bather. Swimming in the Atlantic Ocean is like jumping into a warm bath, and the pools (every hotel has one) are filled with the same warm, salty water. Our hotel had a private beach, with white beach chairs, umbrellas and other comfortable equipment provided for the bather.

FASHIONS Fetching fashions were displayed in every store on Lincoln Rd., a palm-lined avenue on which all the famous name stores of New York City are represented. Far more interesting to all of us, however, were two fashion shows presented during meals.

START WITH TAN The Florida formula for summer fashion is to start with a deep tan. Cotton is the word in every garment, from a bathing suit to Bermuda shorts. Dresses were shown, with pink the dominating color, in short, full-skirted varieties. Shoes were fragile, strapped affairs, in white and black patent leather. Straw bags often caught a color in the dress pattern . . . white, pink and baby blue . . . and were spangled by tiny artificial flowers of matching color. A straw beach hat, with rainbow ribbons of variegated size, was one novelty which caught my eye.

For evening wear, the models chose strapless dresses covered by jeweled jackets or sweaters. Again, cottons were good, but black and white prevailed in dashing patterns. Sparks of color in accessories enhanced solid colors for the evening. Straw bags were traded for cloth ones, jeweled for the most part.

### CONVENTION WORK

To those of us attending the convention, however, there was little time to explore the unlimited resources of Miami. Finding new friends from Maine to Texas, learning about Pi Beta Phi's history, meeting the Grand Council (governing body of the sorority) and getting new ideas from workshops were gained in a full schedule provided for the week's convention. Our time at the Roney Plaza was climaxed by a huge banquet Saturday night, which officially ended convention.

Before my trip to Miami Beach I spent a few days with my brother in Augusta, Ga. Impressions of this southern state were of the red clay soil, a hot, humid climate, and living designed for out-of-doors.
