Barbers and the Law  
If I remember correctly, the legal minimum price for a haircut in California is ninety cents (90c), even though the price agreed upon by master barbers and members of the barbers' union is \$1.50 in Los Angeles County. The recent talk about raising the price to \$2 is merely propaganda in my personal opinion. I think that what the barbers really want is for the State of California to enact a law making the legal minimum price of a haircut \$1.50. Please remember that I am talking about haircuts for men and boys, not girls and women. I want all barbers to write to me at once, telling me what they think the California State Legislature should do for them in the 1955 session. I also want customers of barbers to write to me at Post Office Box 777, Inglewood 1, California, telling me what they think is a fair price for a haircut.

Anti-Tipping Laws  
You probably know that I get many letters telling me we should have a law against tipping in California. I always reply that we have too many laws on the statute books now and that an anti-tipping law cannot be enforced. For example, I belong to a club which has a rule which says that any member who tips an employee will be dropped from the membership rolls. At the same time the club adds 10 per cent to each bill for tips, but these tips are not given to the employees until they have worked for the club for at least one year. Since many of the employees leave before a year of service, they do not receive any of this money. To my personal knowledge, most members of the club tip the employees 10 per cent openly, and still pay 10 per cent on the bill. Thus we find a rule broken.

Tipping Waiters  
When I was very young, from the age of 15 to the age of 18, I was successively, a bus boy, dish washer, waiter, fry cook, head waiter, and finally an assistant manager of a restaurant. From this very valuable experience, I learned a great deal about men and boys but I still do not understand girls and women, which is probably a good thing.

When I enter a restaurant, barber shop, or taxicab, I ask who is the owner. If I am being waited upon by the owner, I
