Lynwood Loses

Fresh from a 13-6 rout over Chula Vista last week, the Tartars may find a bigger task in pushing down the Knights. Though Lynwood fell 7-2 to San Diego in their opener, they persistently come up with potent ball clubs.

In the line-up for the locals are the regulars, Skip Smith at fullback, Sonny Steele at tailback, Don Frattarole at blocking back, and Jerry Burns at wingback.

Smith and Burns were the key men last week as they zipped to a tally apiece for the victory. Smith is a toughie, who drives hard right down to the last yard.

Frattarole will be calling the plays, a job which he performed exceptionally well last Saturday. His call for a quick trap off tackle which sent Smith booming through for a tee-dee was one example of signal calling which brought praise from the coaches.

Coach Cliff Graybehl said yesterday that he has worked with his charges this week on the boos they made against Chula Vista.

Missed blocks, poor tackling and a tendency to let down at times were the marked deficiencies in the Tartar defense — though it performed ably in the clinches.

Up front the Tartars will be counting on Bob Boss and Denny Hester at ends; Manny Ollough and Tom Vanderpool, tackles; Tom Simons and Ben Hoff, line guards; and other Fred Hill, center.

Plugging for the Warrior backfield will be Joe, plus Don Greco, who came through with plenty of punch against Ventura; Don Kulpaca, a 190-pound fullback from Redondo High; Stan Beck, stellar quarterback who will spell Contestable; Bill McKinney, a 5ft. 7in., 145-pound setback from Morningside High; and, Bob Blackwood, a past Mira Costa whizzer.

Verry will send in a combination of four of these stalwarts to pull the key plays out of the bag should Modesto get the scoring jump on the locals.

Cornell Back
Also off the injured list is Ken Cornell, a 6-foot wingman who excels as a pass receiver, blocker and all-round defensive man. But Bob Bass, who filled Cornell's shoes last Saturday, showed the folks that he wasn't to be soid short in his abilities. Names Backfield
On the local scene, Bob Graded a wingback; Billy Reeves

at the quarterback job; Craig Edman, at tailback; and Jim Smith at fullback, will show on the board as starting backfield men.

Fishing remains good to excellent, depending on what you want on the other end of your yine. Barries, halibut, bonito, a few white sea bass, sculpins, gruppers and the like are checked into nearby landings daily.

The largest barrie brought into Redondo Pier topped 12 lbs. last week. The bonito are hitting a 6lb. average at most spots up and down the coast.

The comparatively new hot spot for stingers, just off Pier Point Landing, provided excitement in more ways than one for members of the Torrance Rod and Gun, fishing in the interclub derby Monday night.

Top catch balanced out at 62½ lbs. and brought anger Gene Cracher a \$40 fishing outfit.

Runner-up, Ben Smith was just allowed to have his first taste with the winner for his sinking the scales at 60½ lbs. Several more landed by others and even more lost. Shirley Smith had one hooked at 9:15 p.m., only to have her line cut on the pier at 11:30 p.m. Must have really been a wopper!

One thing about fishing at pier Point is that you never know when you might end up in the drink. When a stinger is hooked, the anchor is pulled and those in the boat are taken for a ride. The only place for the stingers to pull you is in the middle of the channel in the path of huge freighters, shore boats and the rest.

Bright lights are used, but you never can tell! This kid was going to swim for it three times when Ben was hooked up. Wow!

Fourteen miles south of Bridge Port in the Green Creek area was the stomping grounds for Dave Figueredo, who was one of the many downing a buck over the weekend. His dressed out at 130 lbs. Bob Cole and Chet Trexler worked Big Pines with Bob nailing one going an even 100 lbs. field dressed.
