THIS SUFFERS 26-6 BLAST BY LYNWOOD

The Lynwood Knights made it a real night Friday as they clobbered the Torrance Varsity 26-6 on their home grounds in a non-conference skirmish. The game was one marked with heart-breaking fumbles, costly penalties and mistakes.

After a fairly quiet first period, in which the Tartars failed to make a first down, but kept the Knights in tow, the Lynwooders gathered in a Torrance fumble for a tally.

The Tartar defense buckled down as the hosts continued to drive towards the Torrance front door. After holding the Knights for four downs within the local's 10 yard line, Torrance took over on Downs.

Fumble Spells TD
First play, Fullback Skip Smith took the snap from center, plunged towards left guard and was hit by a swarm of tacklers. The seed spurred high into the air and into the grasping hands of Lynwood's Max McCartney who joined over for the initial score. Meredith Perkins booted the conversion.

The score seemed to be all the Lynwood crew needed for a chance to get rolling—within two minutes they tallied a second time.

A screen pass to Perkins moved the skin to the Torrance 19, and two plays later they pushed to the 10. Here, George Massick ripped off center to go over standing up. Again, Perkins PAT was good.

Now, with but less than 2 minutes remaining in the first half, the Torrance drive sputtered to life—and the first local first down of the game was made.

After taking the Knight's kickoff, Billy Meecham tossed to Bob Hanks for a first down. Smith carried twice for a yard in first down, and after roughing the passer penalty scored the ball to the Lynwood 24.

Clock Runs Out
Smith blasted through for 5 as the clock ticked off the seconds. Meecham threw to Denny Hester for a yard—a first down and Hester stepped out of bounds to stop the clock. Another incomplete pass used up a few more seconds.

With less than 4 seconds showing on the board, the referee merely draped a towel over the Tartars, who held the shortest huddle known to man.

Meecham took the pass from center, stepped back and threw to Jerry Burns who had found a hole on the line. Burns snapped up the seed, and with a tackler already in tow, lunged forward for the score. The conversion was blocked.

Fans had fervored hopes that the Tartars would come back after intermission showing that they displayed in the final minutes of the opening half. But they were disappointed. If they came back with renewed vigor, Lynwood returned with even more.

Oloque Intercepts
After a so-called third period marked by an interception by Torrance's Manual Oloque, the hosts rallied to another tally, from 11 yards out, by Massick.

Another score, after a long pass play was broken up by Jim Donnette who leaped high into the air to bat away the ball from its intended receiver, was made minutes later.

After Donnette broke up the pass, excited Tartar linemen clobbered Lynwood's passer, and a 15 yard penalty moved the ball to the Tartar 1. Perkins pushed over for the final score.

Coaches Cliff Graybehl and Dick Leech tried every defense in the book against the menacing Lynwood attack, but were unable to get their charges to fill the right gaps.

Lynwood Rocks Tartars
Lynwood backs consistently rocked the Tartar line, and were effective at nearly every position except against Tom Vanderpool. Van played 60 minutes of powerful ball.

Manual Oloque was particularly aggressive, as was Carlos Skaggs, but Skaggs lacks on pass defense, partly because of his height. Carlos, who ranks high in All-Bay League competition as a line backer, is in the business. He's in on every play.

Tartarbabes Nip 13-7 Win Over Lynwood Knights

A touchdown by Jim Hawthorth in the first quarter, and another tally by Bob Grajeda in the final period gave the Torrance Bees a 13-7 victory over Lynwood in their first game of the season, Thursday.

The first tee-off came after a series of power plays moved the locals to the Knight 20 yard line. There, Hawthorth plowed over left tackle, and knifed the distance for the score. Tom Kulp took a pass for the point after touchdown.

Muff Scoring Chance
A second period scoring threat by the Tartarbabes was muffed, after Hawthorth intercepted a pass from Lynwood's Steve Bach on the foe 35 yard line. A series of penalties badly hurt the Torrance chances and they were forced to boot out of trouble.

Final score for the Tartars came in the last quarter, and was set up by another intercepted pass, this time by Craig Edmans. The locals pushed to the 12, and Grajeda blasted off right end for the 6 points. A PAT was no good.

Lynwood's lone score was in the last 2 minutes of play, and was made on a pass from Bach to Denzel Aria, from the Torrance 8. An off-sides penalty against the Tartars gave the invaders a second chance at the conversion, which they made.

Tartars Fight Hard
Hard play key-noted the fray, with the locals playing heads-up all most of the time. Penalties seriously hurt the Tartar chances many times throughout the afternoon, as did fumbles. A couple of poor hand-offs accounted for at least two bobbles, which resulted in yardage losses, as recoveries were made by the Torrance gridder.

Coach Don Peffer apparently had fired up his crew to a high fervor as they consistently fought to win—though some times lacked the defensive tactics to halt the Lynwood backs through the local line.

Don Greco and Gerie Wight teamed up for the only touchdown of the night, and that after 12 minutes had elapsed in the opening period.

Greco took in a fourth down punt offering deep in the Warrior territory, darted across the turf, reversed to Wight who zipped 80 yards up the field for the tally.

Bill Pierce kicked the conversion to put the topper on the only scoring effort of the day, Contestable Throws.
