Swimming Pool Clean, Healthy

Most of us think back to the carefree days of our youth and recall the fun we had in some "old swimmin' hole." We remember diving from the big tree or playing follow-the-leader off the big rock.

However, since that time a great deal has happened to that stream. The locker plant or some other industrial plant is dumping its waste water in the stream and the Board of Health reports that it is badly polluted. The water is no longer clear and is now murky. Some one has dumped trash, broken bottles, and tin cans into the hole and made the bottom unsafe.

Streams Polluted

National organizations, like the American Red Cross, warn against rising stream pollution, the lack of safety devices and supervision, the possibility of unmarked drop-offs, improper diving facilities, poor beaches with poor entries into the water, and periodic pollution scares that the old fashioned swimming hole had. In terms of proper swimming instruction, the ocean beach is the poorest place in the world to learn to swim.

Pools Cleaned

Contrasting this is the modern swimming pool where the water is sparkling clear, and perfectly safe from harmful bacteria. This pool is properly protected by trained life guards who are qualified to conduct swimming lessons for all ages.

The pool has a smooth bottom without any dangerous projections and is also provided with an easily grasped curbing around the pool. This pool, due to its central location, serves the entire community where children learn to swim at a very early age. The pool itself is integrated with the community recreational program.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received up to 9 o'clock a.m., of October 19, 1954 by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, in its offices at Room 504, Hall of Records, in the City of Los Angeles, for the purchase of the following described bonds of Torrance Unified School District in the par value of One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,400,000.00). Each of said bonds will be dated November 1, 1954, and will bear interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, which shall be in multiples of one-fourth (1/4) of one per cent (1/4%), and which rate of interest shall be determined upon the sale. The interest for the first year shall be payable in one installment at the end of said year, and all interest thereafter shall be payable semiannually, both principal and interest to be payable in lawful money of the United States, at the Treasury of the County of Los Angeles, or at any of the fiscal agencies of the County of Los Angeles in the City of New York, State of New York, or in the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, at the option of the holders. Said bonds will be designated Section 1954, Series A.

The bonds herein referred to were voted for the purpose of raising money for the purchasing of school lots; the building or purchasing of school buildings; the making of alterations or additions to the school building or buildings other than such as may be necessary for current maintenance, operation, repair; the repairing, repainting, or redecking of any school building damaged or in need of repair; the permanent improvement of the carrying out of the projects or purposes authorized in Section 18010 of the Education Code.

Torrance Unified School District has been acting as a unified school district under the laws of the State of California continuously since January 24, 1947.

The assessed valuation of the taxable property in said unified school district for the fiscal year 1954-55 is \$83,806,560.00, and the amount of bonds previously issued and outstanding as of September 8, 1954, is \$5,340,000.00.

The percentage of tax delinquency for Torrance Unified School District for the last five years is as follows:

Torrance Unified School District includes an area of approximately 19.25 square miles, and the estimated population of said unified school district is 67,360.

The bonds will be sold for cash only and at not less than par and accrued interest.

Each bid must state that the bidder offers par and accrued interest to the date of delivery, and state separately the premium, if any, and the rate of interest offered for the bonds bid for.

Each bid shall be for the entire amount of said bonds at a single rate of interest, and may not be for the entire amount of said bonds or for varying rates of interest will be rejected.

Payment for and delivery of bonds will be made in the office of the Board of Supervisors.

A certified or cashier's check for a sum not less than 5% of the amount of the bonds bid for payable to the order of the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, must accompany every bid as a guaranty that the bidder, if successful, will accept and pay for the bonds described in the accepted bid in accordance with the terms of his bid, and said check shall remain in the possession of the Board of Supervisors until all of said bonds are paid for in full.

The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. The Board also reserves the right to disregard substantial irregularities and technical defects in bids.

At the time of payment for and delivery of the bonds the County will furnish the buyer or its agent a certificate that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the bonds.
