Prof to Explain Meaning of Vote

The effect Tuesday's election will have on the average citizen will be discussed by John de la Haye, coordinator of instruction at El Camino College, in the third of a series of free public affairs talks at 7:30 Wednesday night at the Fern Ave. School auditorium.

Dr. de la Haye will devote part of his talk to an interpretation of election results, while the remainder will be on "Democracy in a Hostile World." The forum series is sponsored by the Torrance Council PTA, and presented by the School of Adult Education.

In the second talk last Wednesday Prof. Doyce Nunnis, of the University of Southern California, told the audience that although the Constitution is based on a series of checks and balances, the legislative branch is now trying to curtail the powers of the executive.

This, he believed, would be disastrous for the rights of the individual citizen.

Disease List Quadruples; Measles Lead

The number of diseases in the Torrance health area took a big jump during the week ending Oct. 23, as 43 cases were reported to the County Health Department, compared with 10 the previous week.

Mumps, with 12 cases, five of them in Torrance, showed a sharp jump, as did shingles, an intestinal infection, which had seven cases, two of them in Torrance. Redondo Beach reported six cases of mumps, while Gardena had four cases of shingles.

Measles, polio, and gonorrhea each had four reported cases, with whooping cough, leading disease for several weeks, down to only one case.

Also on the list were two cases each of chickenpox, infectious hepatitis, pneumonia, and tuberculosis, and one case each of epilepsy, and syphilis. One case of measles, pneumonia and tuberculosis were in the city of Torrance.

Chamber in Carson OKs 1955 Budget

A \$1215 budget was approved Monday by the Carson Chamber of Commerce for the fiscal year, ending June 30, 1955.

The group also agreed to present a new banner to the Dominguez-Carson Rotary Club.

In other action, Earl Hollman was appointed to study problems concerning financing of secondary roads. The board also agreed to inquire into zoning requests by several individuals.

President L. O. Griffith announced he had received specifications for a new building for Scott Park from Supervisor Burton W. Chace. Bids will be let Dec. 15 for the building, which will cost about \$17,500.
