


BEES RARIN' TO GO AGAINST LEUZINGER

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Tartars Go After Fourth League Shutout

Gridmen Travel To Leuzinger Tomorrow Eve

One-two-three-four shut-outs in a row would not only give the Torrance High varsity a boost for the BIG game with Santa Monica two weeks away, but put them in contention for a play-off fray in CIF circles.

So they journey to Lawndale tomorrow night at 8 o'clock to do battle with the Leuzinger Olympians, who have yet to muster a conference win, and have scored against only one league foe—Santa Monica!

Torrance's decisive victory over Redondo last week put them as good favorites to blast through with another win this week.

Coaches Cliff Graybehl and Dick Leach relied on plain old hard ball last week, and it apparently paid off. Nothing fancy, just good defensive work coupled with hard offensive play and the Tartars plugged away for four touchdowns.

Long Injury List

Leuzinger is suffering a long injury list, topped by the loss of All-Bay Leaguer John Montoya, who suffered serious leg injuries in their mix with Centennial.

Montoya will be replaced by Skip Zeiler at the left guard slot. Coach Bill Hoyt said yesterday that injuries throughout the season have cost them a real chance to even prove to themselves what they can do if they ever get rolling.

But he expressed optimism that his crew is not one to give up, and has no intentions of allowing Tartars like Skip Smith, Al Rainwater, Sonny Steele and Don Fratartore to roll over them helplessly.

Standouts in the fray last week for the local outfit were Bob Hanks, a wizard in getting downfield to fill his blocking assignments; Denny Hester, who can catch a ball and sprint away against all odds; Tom Vanderpool, a tiger on the line; Bob Boss, a big, hard-hitting, pass-nagging end; and Carlos Skaggs, who should win his place on the Bay League and All-CIF squads hands down.

Skaggs is a line-backer deluxe, and would bolster the ranks of any squad.

Use Split-Tee

The Tartars will be using their noggin against the Olympians' Split-T formation, operated by signal caller Don Christian, halfbacks Gordon Fleming, and Bill Bender, and fullback Floyd Payne.

They also boast an extremely heavy line, almost reaching college proportions.

Torrance's chances in the Bay League race have been blighted by but one loss so far, that to Centennial, who has yet to be scored upon this season. The Apaches cooled the locals 25-0, and have rolled up big scores each week, capped with a 61-0 win over Paramount Saturday night.
