Las Vecinas Club Helps Aged at County Hospital

At the first meeting this year of Las Vecinas Women's Club, Dr. Herschel Kopp of Harbor General Hospital asked that the club concentrate on the needs of the older peoples' wards for the coming year. Dr. Kopp explained that the older people sometimes are without relatives or friends to visit them, and often their small pensions will not even cover the costs of toilet articles.

The club provided two more walkers to be used by the older people's wards. Among the personal items sent in the same shipment were twelve robes and slippers, a large case of toilet tissues and six dozen tooth brushes.
