In discussing the schooling systems in other countries, it was generally agreed that schooling is free up to about 14 years of age, and all of the subjects are chosen by the school and each student must take what is prescribed. It is only after the completion of this schooling that the student may prepare for a trade and these schools are always at the expense of the student. If a student fails in one subject, the whole semester must be repeated. Learning to cook and sew are taught at home or in special schools rather than in grade schools. Foreign children attend school at least part time on Saturday.

The student display for the meeting was by the fifth grade. The fifth grade teachers explained the three phases of education shown. Mr. John Chelinger spoke of physical education. Besides learning to play games, the children belong to an umpires' club and learn how to control outdoor activities. Mr. John Wren explained the many audiovisual aids a present-day teacher has to use in explaining lessons. There are radios and programs designed especially for student consumption. There are phonographs, projectors for both films and slides, with film being available upon request. Films help particularly in social studies to show how people from foreign countries live and what they do for a living.
