RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Scalloped Potatoes and Ham

4 cups thinly sliced, peeled potatoes
 2 cups sliced, cooked ham
 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 1/2 cup fat
 1/4 cup finely cut onion
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Arrange potatoes and ham in layers in a greased baking dish holding about 6 cups. Mix rest of ingredients and pour over top. Lift potato mixture gently with a fork so milk mixture reaches bottom of dish. Bake on center rack of 350 oven (moderate) about 1 1/2 hours, or until potatoes are tender when pierced with a fork. Serve hot from the baking dish. Makes 4 servings.
