Lady Betty Cake Recipe Given by Mrs. Ted Wheat

Another of Torrance's best cooks comes forward with a favorite recipe. Mrs. Ted M. Wheat, wife of the bishop of the Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints, who in her church activities has every need for a favorite cake, contributes her "Lady Betty Cake" recipe. Mrs. Wheat came to Torrance 14 years ago from Salt Lake City. She is active with the Mutual Improvement Assn. in the church which consists of young people from 12 years of age. She is the mother of one son, Kenneth, 16. Lady Betty Cake 1/2 c shortening

- 1 1/2 c sugar
4 eggs (separated)
1 1/2 c flour
1/4 tsp salt
2 tsp baking powder
3 tsp unsweetened chocolate
1 c milk
Cream shortening and add sugar beating continuously. Add beaten egg yolks. Beat well. Sift together flour, salt, and baking powder. Add flour mixture and milk alternately, a little at a time to egg, shortening and sugar mixture. Mix thoroughly and add melted chocolate. Add nuts. Fold in beaten egg white and bake in moderate oven, 30 to 35 minutes.
