Cherry Crumb Pie Apropos For Washington's Birthday

CHERRY CRUMB PIE

2 cups cherries
1/2 cup plain pastry
3/4 cup sugar
1 tsp vanilla
1/3 cup cherry juice

2 tbs. cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup butter
2 cup flour
1/2 tsp cinnamon

Arrange cherries in nine-inch pastry-lined pie pan. Pour in cherry juice with vanilla. Sprinkle with 3/4 cup sugar mixed with cornstarch. Mix remaining 1/2 sugar with flour and cinnamon; cut in butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over cherries. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) 10 minutes, then in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 35 minutes. Cool and serve topped with whip cream.

Lecturer Points Out Steps For Securing World Peace

Mrs. Loretta Baker Valley gave the third in her series of six lectures at the Assistance League of San Pedro on Tuesday.

Having just returned from her annual trip east where she interviewed publishers, columnists, editors and key people in the government, she stated that she always has a question prepared to open each interview, her question being "What can the United States do to carry us along toward world peace?"

Without exception each person interviewed agreed on three important steps: the United States should work with and through the United Nations; the United States should cement ties and friendship with Great Britain, and with India.

Mrs. Valley told of attending the American Assembly, a vitally important organization formed in 1950 by President Eisenhower, operated under the graduate school of business at Columbia University and financed by industrial, cultural, financial and religious groups, and also many Labor Unions, as well as many other groups.
