**New Classes Set for Next Semester in Adult School**

With the start of the new semester Monday, a number of new adult education classes will be open at Torrance Evening High School.

A class in public speaking will be offered Monday nights from 7 to 9:30 in room 101. Training will also be given in salesmanship, personality, how to conduct a meeting, and how to make presentations and introductions.

For those interested in obtaining a high school diploma two new classes will be offered: English, with emphasis on literature and writing, Tuesday and Thursday from 7 to 9:30 p.m.; and U.S. History on Monday and Wednesday from 7 to 9:30 p.m.; a class in blueprint reading on Tuesday and Thursday from 7 to 9:30; and a class in lampshade making on Wednesday evening from 7 to 10 o'clock. All of these classes will be held at Torrance High School.

A new rug-making class will feature hooked and braided rugs and mats, according to Miss Johnson, the instructor. This class will meet on Wednesday afternoons from 1 to 4 in the Red Cross Building, 2325 Torrance Blvd.

For mothers with children between the ages of 2 and 5, a child observation class will start on Friday morning, Feb. 11, from 9 to 12, at the Methodist Church, corner of El Prado and Manuel Aves.

New dressmaking and sewing classes will be started Feb. 10 at the Watteria Park clubhouse on Thursday mornings from 9:30 to 12:30.

A similar demand for more cake decorating classes has resulted in a new class being started at the Seaside School on Wednesdays from 7 to 10 p.m., beginning Feb. 9.

No registration or tuition fee is charged for these adult classes, offered by the Torrance Unified School District. Additional information may be obtained at FA 8-2272, or at the Adult Education office in Torrance High School.

1 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon scraped onion  
6 wooden skewers  
1 egg  
Fine cracker crumbs  
2 slices bacon  
Mix together the hamburger, salt, onion and egg. Divide into 6 equal portions. Form around 3 inches of ends of skewers in shape of drumsticks. Roll in crumbs. Place in a baking dish. On top of each, place 1/3 slice of bacon. Bake in a very hot oven (450) 30 minutes. Serve with catsup or chili sauce or hot tomato or mushroom sauce.
