**Mental Health Service to Give Comic Opera**

A gala charity performance of Gilbert and Sullivan's comic opera, "PATIENCE," will soon be staged in the San Pedro High School Auditorium by Sidons Productions of Scripps and Claremont Men's College, Claremont. It has been announced here by the Harbor District Mental Health Service.

The dramatic group from the Associated Colleges at Claremont will be seen in two performances, 2:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 12, with proceeds to be devoted to the "pat" mental health project which now serves some eighteen communities in this area.

The Harbor District Mental Health Service was organized in 1953 by a small group of concerned citizens aided by state officials as an experiment in non-institutional treatment of the mentally disturbed. The purpose of the clinical service, which has its headquarters in the Health Center building in San Pedro, is to prevent cases from reaching a point where institutional treatment is necessary.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Marble Cake**

1 Tablespoon melted shortening  
2 Tablespoons cocoa (see note)  
2 Tablespoons instant 34 cup Per warm water  
1 1/2 cups white or yellow cake mix (see note)  
1/2 cup Per evaporated MILK  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda

Grease well, then dust with flour, a 9-inch square cake pan. Mix shortening, cocoa, sugar and water. Let stand. Put cake mix into a 2-quart bowl. Add half of mixture of milk and water. Beat hard 1 minute with spoon of electric beater at medium speed. Stir in rest of milk mixture and beat hard 2 minutes. Pour about 3/4 of batter into prepared pan. Stir baking soda into cocoa mixture. Beat cocoa mixture into rest of batter and spoon it over top of light batter in pan. Cut through batter with knife for marbled effect. Bake on rack slightly below center in 350 oven (moderate) about 45 minutes, or until cake pulls from sides of pan. Remove from oven and let stand in pan 10 minutes before turning out to cool. Serve plain, or spread with your favorite frosting.

NOTE: Use a well-known brand that calls for milk on the package and weighs just 1 lb. 1 oz., or 17 oz.
