Airman Recruit Program Opens

The Airman Recruit program of the United States Navy has been reestablished commencing this month. Commanding Officer B. D. Dutton, officer in charge of Navy recruiting for Southern California and Arizona, reported this week.

Young men from 17 to 31 interested in Naval aviation careers may now, when qualified, enlist in the Navy as an airman recruit. Under this program the airman recruit will be assigned directly into naval aviation upon completion of his basic training. Applicants in this category will be sent to an airman school where, upon graduation, they may qualify for further training in one of twelve different aviation schools.

In order to qualify as a naval airman recruit the applicant must be in good physical health, have normal color perception, and must be a high school graduate, or have evidence of equivalent training. In addition he must pass the Armed Forces qualification test with airman recruit scoring and have no more than one dependent.

Full information on the Airman Recruit program may be obtained at any Navy Recruiting Station. Most communities in Southern California and Arizona have at least one Navy recruiting station; the southwest stations are located at 111 N. El Paseo, Redondo Beach and 16422 Vermont Ave., Gardena.
