Measles Lead Week's List Of Diseases

Measles accounted for over half of the cases of disease reported in the Torrance health district during the week ending Feb. 5. County health officials reported this week.

Of 74 reported cases of disease, measles claimed 41 victims, eight of them in Torrance. Manhattan Beach had 17; Redondo Beach, 6; and Hermosa Beach and County territory, each 5.

Fifteen cases of mumps, four of them in Torrance, and seven cases of chickenpox, two in Torrance, were reported. Also reported were five cases of scarlet fever, three of pneumonia, two of German measles, and one of whooping cough.

Torrance had one case each of scarlet fever and whooping cough.
