El Camino Shop Students To Build Complete House

Construction of a two bedroom home will begin on the campus of El Camino college within the next two weeks as an instructional project for students enrolled in college carpentry and mill cabinet classes.

The five-room house will cover an area of approximately 850 square feet, with a length of 36 feet and a width of 24 feet. Each phase of construction will be completed by students with the exception of plumbing and floor finishing, which will be done by local business firms.

Heading the project will be Joseph Dzida, carpentry and mill cabinet instructor, who believes that the practical instruction offered through the project will prove invaluable for the students. He stresses the necessity of application of shop

studies to the actual construction of a building.

Art and interior decorating classes will cooperate in the project by contributing interior plans and color schemes for the interior, working with the shop classes in some phases of construction.

The exterior of the home Dzida says, will be done in redwood with the interior done in the dry wall style. The home will feature a ceramic tile bath, hardwood floors, tile drain-board in the kitchen, and, possibly, a disposal unit.

Most of the work accomplished by shop students to date has consisted of service, repair, and minor construction projects on desks, cabinets, and bookshelves. Classroom instruction has stressed cabinet work and

"mock-ups," which feature the construction of walls and sections for instructional purposes.

House to be Sold
Construction of the new home on campus will be entirely instructional in nature. On completion, the home will be placed on sale at auction to cover building expenses. Dzida announced. He anticipates that the building will be completed next semester.

itt Hallberg, William Gibbons, Cleveland Riley, and Dwight Wilson.

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
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
