Based on Chanute Air Force Base, Ill., and operating under the Technical Training Air Force, mobile training detachment personnel are assigned, usually on a temporary status, to air bases in the most remote spots of the globe.

There the regularly assigned personnel attend classes in the same hangars, radio shops and radar stations where they will apply their new knowledge.

The demand for top quality in the end product is achieved through various means, some of them recognized techniques and others originated by the Air Force to fill its unusual training requirements.

The Technical Training Air Force, a sub-division of Air Force Training Command, was organized three years ago during the Korean conflict, and since that time has graduated over one million technicians.
