

Torrance Garden Club And JayCettes Release Rules for Annual Show

Torrance Terrace Garden Club and the JayCettes of Torrance, co-sponsors of the Hobby, Art and Flower Show scheduled for May 6, 7, and 8 at the Torrance Civic auditorium are releasing the following rules for entrance in the show and the various classifications in the different sections of the show.

All exhibits must be in place by noon Friday, May 6. Exhibits may be arranged on Thursday, May 5, and may not be removed until the end of the show. Judging will begin at 1 p.m. on Friday, May 6, and no one will be allowed in the auditorium during the judging. Prize ribbons will be awarded under each classification. There will be no admission or registration fees and entries will be guarded at all times. These rules apply to all sections.

The following are the classifications of the Flower section sponsored by the Garden club:

- Section 1: Line arrangement in tall containers.
- Section 2: Arrangement featuring bulbous flowers "including iris".
- Section 3: Bottle arrangement with oriental touches.
- Section 4: Arrangement with oriental touches.
- Section 5: All foliage arrangement.
- Section 6: Groups arrangement (two or more related arrangements no more than 24 inches in width overall).
- Section 7: Arrangements with candles.
- Section 8: Arrangement in a basket featuring spring flowers; and Section 9: Arrangement with wood or rock predominating.
- Section 10: Arrangement featuring one variety of flowers, any foliage permitted.
- Section 11: Miniature arrangement (2" and 3").
- Section 12: Potted plants (Group 1: 2 to 4 inches; Group 2: 4 to 6 inches; Group 3: 6 to 8 inches; Group 4: 8 to 10 inches).
- Section 13: Miniature arrangement (2" and 3").
- Section 14: Children's Group (ages 2 to 12 yrs.).
- Section 15: Arrangements (A) Arrangements; (B) Miniature arrangements; (C) I not to exceed 2 inches; II not to exceed 5 inches; (D) Cut flowers; (E) Potted plants; (F) Corsages; (G) Table arrangements; (H) Vegetable or fruit arrangement; (I) Shadow boxes; (J) Hanging baskets; and (K) Miscellaneous.

The following is the classification of the Art Display section sponsored by the JayCettes: Section 1: Oil Painting; Section 2: Water Colors; Section 3: Pencil Sketches; Section 4: Charcoal Drawings; and (B) Photographs.

Section 5: Ceramics and plastercraft; Section 6: Hand modeling; Section 7: China Painting; Class (A) Porcelain; Section 8: Collections; Section 9: Coppercraft; Section 10: Crepe paper art; Section 11: Wood fiber art; Section 12: Lamps; Class (A) Lamps with shades; and (B) Lampshades; Section 13: Fancy work; Class (A) Miscellaneous.

The following is the classification of the Hobby Display section sponsored by the JayCettes: Section 1: Hand-decorated; (B) Sugar Art; Section 2: Ceramics and plastercraft; Class (A) Hand modeling; Section 3: China Painting; Class (A) Porcelain; Section 4: Collections; Section 5: Coppercraft; Section 6: Crepe paper art; Section 7: Wood fiber art; Section 8: Lamps; Class (A) Lamps with shades; and (B) Lampshades; Section 9: Fancy work; Class (A) Miscellaneous.
