Entry Deadline Set Tomorrow

Doors for the seventh annual Hobby, Art, and Flower show at the Torrance Civic Auditorium will swing open to the public at 6 p.m. tomorrow and remain open Friday evening, Saturday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sunday from 12 noon to 9 p.m.

Cosponsored by the Torrance Terrace Garden Club, JayCettes, and Torrance Recreation Dept., the show has come to be a highlight in the area for the display of art and hobby talents. Thousands are attracted to the show each year. This year, for the first time, trophies will be given out to sweepstake winners. Trophies will be presented to winners in four classifications for flowers and one each for hobby and arts. Trophy winners also will receive sweepstake ribbons. Prize ribbons will be awarded for sweepstakes, special, first, second, third, and honorable mention entries.

Deadline on flower entries will be tomorrow noon. Deadline for hobby and art entrants is today. Judging of the entries will begin promptly at 1 p.m. tomorrow.




Home Economics Discussed


Forrest, chairman of the professional interests group, lead a discussion on sabbatical leave recommendations, standards for teacher evaluation, and recommendations on class size.

Police Catch Armed Pair After Chase

Two armed robbers who got \$75 at the Walteria Liquor Store, 24241 Ward St., late Tuesday night, were picked up by Los Angeles Police shortly afterward at 190th and Western Ave. after a wild chase.

Grant S. Stickney, clerk in the store, called Torrance Police, who in turn put out a description of the car. Officers John J. Baustian and Virgil E. Nelson spotted the auto, and stopped it after a chase at speeds estimated up to 80 miles per hour.

According to Detective Capt. Ernie M. Ashton, Arco Gene Ellison, 24, of Compton, and Otto Friedli, 23, of Whittier, admitted making the robbery. Charges will be filed against the pair, Ashton said.

Stickney said one of the men came in and asked for cigarettes, left, and then returned with the other man. The pair then pulled a gun and got \$75, of which \$50 was in bills and \$25 in change. State records indicate that the gun was stolen in a Santa Barbara burglary in 1953.
