The annual event was attended by 21,250 adults according to final Fair figures, released Monday by the sponsoring Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Since the kiddies, who were admitted free to the affair, were not counted in official attendance figures, the exact number of fairgoers was not determined.

Service Civic Groups and civic clubs prominent in Fair operation included Elks, Optimists, Moose, Lions, Civitan, JayCettes, Exchange, Firemen and North Torrance Civic Improvement Association.

Clubs that had booths and concessions on Gold Gulch will keep the profits they collected. Fair officials agreed.

Virginia Gots, Lions club candidate, was Queen of the Fair and Rodeo. She received a trip to Mexico City as first prize.

Other queen candidates included Norma Prange, NTCIA, second; Mrs. M. J. Timiney, JayCettes, third; Maurine Bradford, Optimists; Betty Morris, Elks; Carol Duncan, Moose; Janene Colombo, Civitan; Bette Roeder, Exchange club, and Darlene Forrer, Firemen.
