

PORTER, MILLER ISSUE CALL TO TARTAR GRID CANDIDATES

Thursday, Sept. 1 is the coming out day for candidates for the 1955 Torrance Tartar football Varsity, coach Don Porter announced recently.

Porter expects a heavy turnout for the Varsity. Tartarbes report the next day, Friday, Sept. 2.

Physical examinations and equipment check-outs will feature the first day schedule for both squads.

Porter will be assisted by Jack Miller, who will also handle the Tartarbes.

Open Sept. 23
The Varsity launches its schedule on Sept. 23, when they host Glendale Hoover, on the athletic field. The Bees do not start their schedule until Sept. 23, when they tangle with Long Beach Wilson at Torrance. The Bees were set to open their slate against Glendale Hoover on Sept. 22, but the game was canceled.

Porter looks to hard-charging fullback Skip Smith to spearhead the Tartar's split "T" formation, which he will install this year. Smith and quarterback Bill Meacham are veterans who will carry the offensive load.

Both the Varsity and Bees will play a full, five game Bay League schedule. Other area prep teams in the loop are Inglewood, Redondo, Centennial,

Ward Paces Slim Win Over Legion

Single tallies in the first and second innings provided the winning margin Friday night at Torrance Park, as the Fire Department's "B" team, Blue Streak loop champs, toppled the American Legion, 2-1, and took the city slop pitch softball title.

The winners scored early and hung on to preserve the win for hurler Bob Moffitt. Moffitt went the route and picked up his second successive win over the Legion.

The Legion club, winners of the Service Club League, thus dropped the Torrance championship by losing two straight to the Firemen. The series was a best of three affair.

Singles by leftfielder Roy Holloman and second baseman-manager Bob Ward set up the first of the winners' tallies. Holloman came all the way around to score on Ward's hit and a pair of infield outs.

In the second frame Dean White, Firemen first sacker, doubled with one out and scored on back-to-back bingles by fielder Harlan Whitacre and catcher Jerry Loy. That was the story.

Keep Plugging
The Firemen kept plugging away, blasting two hits in the third and fifth innings and a solo safety in the sixth, but couldn't come around with any insurance runs.

Moffitt coasted along and spaced five hits evenly in the first, third, fifth, sixth, and seventh cantos. The Legion crew finally got to Moffitt in the seventh, when he faltered and gave up his first Annie Oakley.

Bob O'Kain led off for the Legion and popped to Firemen's shortstop, Stan Sellers. After catcher John Bennett had bounced out, Sellers to White, Bruno Giacomi drew the first walk of the game.

Bob Ernst powdered Moffitt's next pitch for a booming triple and Giacomi scored easily to break the ice for the Legion. With two away and Ernst roosting on third, Ernie Hobbs, Legion outfielder, grounded weakly to Moffitt, who threw him out to end the struggle.

Neither team committed an error in the tightly-played tussle. Only the five extra hits the Firemen mustered could spell the difference between the two clubs.

Of the winners' 10 hits, manager Ward had a solid three for three, singles in the first, third, and fifth.

All five Legion hits went to five different players. Bennett, Ernst, Hobbs, Lof Briganti and Gordy Smith all had a safety.

Moffitt Wins Both
Hobbs kept the pressure on Moffitt when he came to bat in the final inning with Ernst on third. Hobbs had slashed a single through the middle of his previous trip to the plate on in the fifth inning, and was out to raise his average and keep the Legion hopes alive.

Moffitt got both wins in the play off over the Legion. He had hurled a 7-2 decision over them on Monday at the same park. Ross Hood pitched both games for the Legion.

The Torrance Recreation Department will present the triumphant Firemen with championship awards in the near future.

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Grid Program On Channel 5
"Trojan Review," a feature for the coming football season starring Jess Hill, head football coach at USC, will be viewed Thursdays beginning this week on KTLA, Channel 5, it was announced recently by Klaus Landsberg, vice president of Paramount Television Productions, Inc. and general manager of KTLA.

The show, a question and answer type operation, will find Dick Danahy as moderator firing the questions at the Trojans' coach. The program will cover the air for 14 weeks throughout the gridiron season.

It will give the viewer ample opportunity to learn whether his Monday morning quarterbacking jibes with that of the mentor as well as an insight as to what is in store football-wise for the ensuing week end.

It will occupy the 7:15-7:30 p.m. time slot on Channel 5.

Fewer Deer Taken During Opening Period
Slightly fewer hunters, and correspondingly fewer deer taken, seems to be the general story of the Aug. 6-7 opening weekend of the coastal deer season, according to reports from Department of Fish and Game wardens and other field personnel.

In Southern California, however, about 10 per cent more hunters and a 10 per cent higher bag than last year were reported.

Early deer tag returns at the department's central office in Sacramento totaled 3,645 as of the fifth day of the season, compared with 3,011 returns on the same day last year. But 180 of this year's returns were from Humboldt and San Diego counties, which weren't in last year's coastal season.

Returns were still too fragmentary to give more than a hint of overall trends, the Department emphasized.


High county in the early figures was Mendocino, with a total of 473 returns. This compared with 628 last year. Lake County had 395, up 148 over the 1954 mark.

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
