A Torrance man cooperated in designing a new machine which has reduced drilling time on concave casting from ten hours to 45 minutes at the Northrop Aircraft Co.

Don Lynch, of 17109 Wilton Pl., and Bob Mattson, of Huntington Park, designed the machine. The machine is only 12 square feet of floor space. Seven holes are drilled simultaneously by utilizing a multiple-spindle, semi-automatic boring fixture.

The fixture was built to Northrop specifications by the Angle Computer Co., Glendale, for drilling the rocket pod orifice holes for the Northrop F-8 Scorpion. The gang boring bars make a rough and finish cut in one pass of the tools and the machine is shut off at the end of the cut by a limit switch.

The concave casting is held to the boring fixture by locating pins and this definite indexing of the part insures extreme accuracy.

The operation formerly required a painstaking alignment of the machine bed and head stock by using a dial indicator on a master plate. It was necessary to reset the cutter for each of the seven holes and several rough cuts were required.

By specifying precision castings Northrop expects to further reduce the shop time required to machine the castings.
