It is patterned after a famous chapel on a mountainside near Mexico City.

Episcopalians Name Canadian As New Rector

The Rev. Hugh R. Percy, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church of Winnipeg, Canada, has been named rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, it was announced this week.

He will conduct the 11 a.m. services Sunday on a visit, before returning to the local parish as rector in December. He will attend a coffee hour after the service to meet and talk with the parishioners.

Rector at St. Paul's Church for the past ten years, he has seen it grow tremendously during his pastorate. He previously held positions as missionary and rector in several northern Canadian towns and was a chaplain in the Army during the last war.

He replaces the Rev. Arthur E. Bello, who resigned from the St. Andrew's pastorate on Aug. 1, to accept a position as dean of boys at St. Francis' Boys' Home in Bavaria, Kan.

Evil's Power Lesson Topic This Sunday

"To put down the claim of sin, you must detect it, remove the mask, point out the illusion, and thus get the victory over sin and so prove its unreality." This statement by Mary Baker Eddy in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" (447:24-27) is from the Lesson-Sermon to be read by all Christian Science churches Sunday. The question "Are Sin, Disease, and Death Real?" is the subject.

The story of the Prodigal Son from Luke's Gospel is given. After wasting his inheritance in riotous living and being captivated by the pleasures of sin, he woke from that captivity and saw that sin had only brought him degradation and want. He decided to leave his past experience and seek his father, who had always loved and supplied him. His father seeing him afar off, and discerning his regeneration, ordered the best food and clothing to be brought to him, adding, "For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found" (15:24).

The Golden Text from Romans (8:2) explains further, "The law of the Spirit of Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death."
