

Steelworkers to Vote Tomorrow On International Vice President

Thirty thousand Southern California members of the United Steelworkers of America will mark ballots tomorrow to decide who shall be the union's international vice president.

Candidates in the national referendum election are Howard R. Hague, Pittsburgh, who is currently filling the office by appointment of the union's executive board and President David J. McDonald, and Joseph P. Maloney, Buffalo, the union's New York state director.

Last spring, Maloney, along with five of the 28 executive board members, challenged Hague's appointment.

Hague, a long time administrative assistant to both the late Philip Murray and David McDonald was not a member of the executive board at the time he was selected to fill the spot left vacant by the death last January of James G. Thimmes, steel union's vice president since 1946.

Maloney and the five other directors maintain that the choice should have been made from one of the directors on the executive board, while the

22 other directors, along with McDonald, contend that the constitution of the union grants any member in good standing for five years the right to be an international officer.

Tally of the steel locals in the U. S. and Canada who made their nominations known show 1527 favoring Hague, while Maloney received 540.

The Western District, second largest in the union, headed by Director Charles J. Smith, Los Angeles, a Hague supporter, gave 77 nominations to Hague and 4 to Maloney.

Tomorrow's voting marks the first time in the steel union's 19-year history that a top office is being contested. In prior years, appointments by the executive board to fill vacancies were tantamount to election later by the membership.

Tests McDonald Strength Most labor observers regard the voting as a test of the popularity among the 1,800,000 members for President McDonald and his leadership of the giant union since the death of Murray in 1952.

It was largely through McDonald's influence that his neighborhood chum and later administrative assistant, Howard Hague, gained the endorsement of the executive board.

Both men on tomorrow's ballot play major roles in the union's bargaining. Maloney serves as the chairman of the bargaining committee at Bethlehem Steel Corp., while Hague has been on the committee dealing with United States Steel Corp. since the union's inception in 1937.

Also on the block is the policy of "seeking industrial peace," started by Philip Murray after the steel strike in 1952 and carried out by David McDonald.

While Maloney supporters are touting the efforts to promote better union-management understandings as "getting soft," McDonald and Hague are ready to stake the record wage and benefit gains of over 40 cents an hour won in the past three years without a major strike against a return of what McDonald terms "the dark ages" of union-management relations.

large unions. Previously most of the leaders of the steel union were from the officialdom of the coal miners of John L. Lewis, with the only notable exceptions being the late James Thimmes and Western Director Charles Smith, both from the steel industry.

Hague, who although worked for a short time in the mills of Jones & Laughlin Co. in Pittsburgh, rose in the union mainly on his administrative ability in dealing with collective bargaining agreements and other union services.

Other Contests Traced His rival, Maloney, considered one of the most articulate orators in the union ranks, gained prominence in recent years when several steel union districts in New York state were consolidated into the one he now heads.

Two other contests for directors are being decided in Ohio and Pennsylvania voting. The Western membership will not vote on these.

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Former Local Man Feared Bay Suicide

Fiekema reportedly was a patient at a Veteran's Hospital in Oakland recently. According to another source, he had a nervous breakdown.

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84-Lot Tract Approved by Commission

Only one tract, containing 84 lots, was recommended for approval by the Torrance Planning Commission Wednesday night.

Presented by the Grand Construction Co., tract 20019 is located west of Arlington Ave., between Redondo Beach Blvd., and 164th St. Recommendation was given with the following stipulations.

1. That 20 feet on south side of Redondo Beach Blvd., be dedicated and improved for street purposes.

2. That 10 feet on the west side of Arlington be similarly treated, and that all lots facing this street have turn-around driveways.

3. That all drainage from the tract go east to the New Arlington Flood Control Storm Drain.

4. That Lots 1 through 8 remain in a C-2 zone.

TORRANCE HERALD-347 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ESTABLISHING CERTAIN TRAFFIC CONTROL MEASURES PURSUANT TO ARTICLE IV, ORDINANCE NO. 44.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows: THAT public convenience and necessity requires that traffic control installations be established on certain streets in said city.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the City Council of the City of Torrance that the following regulatory traffic signs be established on the following streets:

1. That STOP signs be posted on Via Paqual at East and West entrances to Monte de Oro.
2. That STOP signs be posted on Calle Mayas at Los Altos.
3. That STOP signs be posted at all four corners of 231st Street and Pennsylvania Avenue.
4. That STOP signs be posted on 220th Street at Cabrillo.

The aforementioned regulatory signs have been determined by the Traffic Commission as necessary, as per Ordinance No. 145 Article IV, and the City Traffic Chief, under said Ordinance and Article, is hereby authorized and directed to erect such signs.

The City Council hereby declares that the increased usage by the automobile driving public of these streets has created a traffic hazard which demands the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of all citizens traversing said streets whether by automobile or as pedestrians, and, having its conclusion upon the aforesaid statement, declares that an urgency exists and that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately after its passage and adoption hereof.

The City Clerk will certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper published, printed and circulated in the City of Torrance, and said newspaper is hereby designated for that purpose.
