Both Torrance and North High Schools were still looking for their first gridiron wins this week, as the Torrance Tartars were edged, 13-7, by Inglewood, and the North Saxons were dumped, 39-0, by Morpingside.

Beside the game, the Tartars also lost the services of their ace quarterback, Bill Meacham, who broke his leg in the encounter.

The Saxon Bees got into the win column for the first time, as they trimmed the Morning-side Bees, 13-7.

Women Aid Children

A group of 30 women began their work as volunteers at Harbor General Hospital to help brighten the lives of youngsters who are confined there.

Polio Vaccine Here

The local office of the County Health Department has received its allotment of the Salk polio vaccine and will begin giving shots to some 2000 local youngsters as scheduled on Nov. 1. Dr. E. A. Kogan, local health officer, announced.

Although shots will begin in other parts of the district on Oct. 25, local schools will not receive them until Nov. 1. Some local schools have already sent out parent's consent forms while others will do so soon. In the Torrance Unified School District, consent of all parents will be required for their children to receive the second shots.

Only second and third graders who last spring got the first shot will be eligible for the shots now. This includes children who have moved into the district since that time.

Building Totals Up

Torrance's mounting building totals continued their upward spiral during October, as permits taken out so far this month pushed the year's total near \$39,000,000, according to Walter Bradford, senior clerk in the City Engineer's office.

Two huge new Kauffman tracts, west of Hawthorne between Torrance and Sepulveda Blvds., containing 180 houses, worth more than \$1,670,000 accounted for much of the total this month. Everett Powell took out permits for 24 houses, valued at \$283,000, located near 162nd and Wilkie Ave.

Action Set on Pit

Prosecution of the owners of a huge diatomite pit in south Torrance and the Palos Verdes area for violation of the "Kathy Fiscus" ordinance is being planned, Capt. R. F. Karney, of Lennox Sheriff's Station said last week.

Acting on a suggestion by Lyle Botenbarr, Regional Planning Commission representative, Karney said inspection showed many steep banks on the hole, which is 60 feet deep and covers 25 to 30-acre area.

Police Seek Burglar

Torrance detectives were investigating a series of Thursday night burglaries in the Waleria area, which, they say, were committed by the same person, who used similar methods in all entries.
