

Meeting Called To Discuss New Triangle Leases

A special Council meeting at which all parties interested in developing the Airport Triangle shopping center are being invited to present their plans, has been called for 7 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 22, in the Council chambers of the City Hall.

The meeting was arranged after Store Properties, Inc., a firm which has been negotiating with the city for a lease since late last year, asked for a chance to appear before the Council to submit a new lease

proposal for the area. The firm has stated that it is prepared to go ahead with the commercial development of the 35-acre parcel.

Negotiations with Store Properties, Inc., had reached the lease-signing stage last February; however the city has not signed the lease. In September, Samuel Genis, president of the firm, died of injuries suffered in an automobile accident which necessitated a change in company officers.

A new lease, incorporating these changes will be submitted to the Council on Nov. 22.

In the meantime, other offers to develop the property have been received by the city. Among those seeking to lease the city-owned land for commercial development is George Binder, who presently owns a large segment of the downtown Torrance commercial property on Sartori and El Prado. His proposal for development of the 35 acres will be considered along with all others at the special meeting, Councilmen have stated.

GIRL INJURED SEPT. 9 STILL LISTED CRITICAL

Little Judy Ann Woolheater, who celebrated her fourth birthday at Harbor General Hospital on Nov. 3, remains on the critical list as the result of injuries she received nine weeks ago when she was struck by an automobile, near her home.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Woolheater, 19005 Burin, Judy has remained in a near unconscious state since the accident although she now smiles in recognition when her mother visits her. She has not spoken since she was injured.

"Judy has been moved out

onto the ward now, so the doctors must think she is doing much better," Mrs. Woolheater told the HERALD Saturday. She said doctors still were not able to determine the full extent of her daughter's injuries.

"The hospital certainly has been marvelous—they have left nothing undone for the girl," Mrs. Woolheater said.

Judy was struck on Sept. 9 by an auto driven by Orvin J. Bee, 27, of 19923 Flavin, as she attempted to cross Halison near Burin. Bee was not held.
