Mayor to Lead New Fund Drive

"The American Red Cross, which is now rendering extensive financial assistance to our flood stricken neighbors in northern California, Oregon, and the northeastern states, demands our utmost support!" declared Albert Isen, local attorney and Mayor of Torrance, upon accepting the chairmanship of the local 1956 Red Cross fund raising appeal.

Isen, who led Torrance's Red Cross fund organization to an over-the-top victory last year, was named to the chief campaign spot this week by Frank Afton, Southwest Regional

chairman, who recently returned from a special one-day tour of the severely stricken Yuba City area where Red Cross is conducting one of its heaviest rehabilitation operations.

Funds Are Gift

"The \$8,000,000 earmarked for the rehabilitation of thousands of families suffering losses in the Christmas holiday flood, along with the \$18,500,000 expended helping victims of the two hurricane floods covering six northeastern states, is an out-and-out grant from the American people, and not a loan," Isen stressed.

This data was the subject of a conference between Isen and Afton, as they mapped plans to hasten the completion of top leadership appointments in the primary interest of assuring a fast and successful fund appeal this spring.

mands imposed upon the Red Cross disaster service, alone, during the past year, I am sure that Torrance will come through the campaign in fine shape," Isen asserted, pointing out that long rehabilitation jobs created by a critical disaster are always the task of Red Cross, which depends entirely upon the annual contributions of the American people to carry out its pledged obligations.

Apart from his City Council and Red Cross duties, Isen is affiliated with the Torrance Lions Club and the Elks Club.
