'Stern Fundamentalists' Head Los Angeles Schools

Two "stern fundamentalists" and strong 3R advocates are now heading the far-flung Los Angeles City School System—Ellis A. Jarvis as superintendent and chief executive officer, and Dr. Louise W. Seyler as deputy superintendent—both appointed to their positions during the past few weeks.

Jarvis, 56, took over as superintendent recently upon the death of Claude L. Reeves. Formerly he was deputy superintendent of schools.

Dr. Seyler, 49, was appointed deputy superintendent only last week. She moved from the position of associate superintendent in charge of the division of instructional services.

Both Are Veterans

Both have had long and successful careers with the local schools. Jarvis joined the city as a teacher in 1924 when he took an assignment at San Pedro High School in mathematics, science, and music. Mrs. Seyler entered the school system as an elementary school teacher in 1928.

Jarvis, who lives with his wife, Margaret, in West Los Angeles, is an accomplished musician. Not only did he work

his way through the University of California at Berkeley by playing the violin and French horn, but for several years in the schools he taught band and orchestra.

The new city superintendent started out to be a petroleum engineer, but the love of young people and a desire to share his scientific knowledge with others brought him into the teaching profession.


Jarvis Promoted

Soon, his superiors made him departmental chairman. From there he rose up through the ranks—as supervisor of mathematics and science, then junior high school vice principal, then principal, and in 1949 he became assistant superintendent for all junior high schools.

When the late Mr. Reeves became a deputy superintendent of schools, he asked Jarvis to head up the newly established position of deputy. While Mr. Reeves was ill, the Board of Education named Jarvis acting superintendent. And after seeing him in action as temporary chief executive officer, the Board unanimously offered him a four-year contract following the death of Mr. Reeves.

As soon as Jarvis became chief of the second largest school system in the United States with more than 540,000 students, 30,000 employees, and 510 schools, he gave immediate attention to one of the big problems at hand—finding a deputy.

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Dr. Seyler Named

Heading the important and large instructional services division was Associate Superintendent Dr. Louise Seyler. This 49-year-old educator, like Jarvis, believed strongly in the importance of basic fundamentals in education. She had worked in both elementary and secondary schools and knew the problems of both. Jarvis nominated Mrs. Seyler for the second top position and the Board of Education unanimously approved the assignment.

Dr. Seyler, who lives with her husband, Henry, in Studio City, also had worked her way up through the ranks. After graduating from UCLA, she joined the faculty at Alessandro St. School as a teacher. Soon she became a counselor and teacher in high school but went back to elementary division as a principal. After one year as head supervisor in the school district's personnel division, she was named assistant superintendent for the Central Elementary District.

Gets New Contract

In 1955, Dr. Seyler was given a four-year contract as associate superintendent for the Instructional Services Division which included supervision over the entire school district curriculum and textbooks.

As deputy superintendent of schools, Dr. Seyler holds the highest position attained by a woman since Mrs. Susan B. Dorsey was superintendent in the 1920's.

So the two educators, working with the Board of Education, lead the destinies of one-half million students, from kindergarten through the adult schools and junior colleges. They are assisted by some 20,000 teachers and 10,000 other staff members who man the typewriters, the buses, the brooms and mops, and run the other business and maintenance items required to keep the Los Angeles City School System operating.
