


Anza School To Open Doors After Holidays

The Anza Elementary School of the Torrance Unified School District is being made ready for 456 children who are expected to arrive on Wednesday, Jan. 2, 1957. Carl Shaner, principal, states that 14 teachers have volunteered to spend a day of their Christmas vacation period for work at the school to help create a stimulating classroom environment. It is expected that all the school's facilities will be available except the cafeteria. This building should be completed and ready for use sometime between Jan. 15 and Feb. 1. The school will serve pupils who are now being provided bus transportation to the Fern-Greenwood and Madrona Elementary Schools. Since all the pupils live within the Anza attendance boundary, and within walking distance no bus transportation will be provided.

The Anza attendance boundaries are as follows: the northern boundary is from the city boundary east on Torrance Blvd. to Anza Ave.; the eastern boundary is south on Anza to Carson St.; the southern boundary is west on Carson to a point east of Barbara St., southwest from this point to the city boundary (includes both sides of Barbara and Glenn Place), and the western boundary is north of the city boundary to Torrance Blvd.

Parents, pupils and teachers look forward to the part they will have in establishing another fine school of the Torrance Unified School District.

Address Report Forms Available

Los Angeles immigration officials announced today that alien address report forms will be available at the 458 South Spring St. immigration office and local post offices beginning Jan. 1 for the convenience of the more than 210,000 aliens expected to report their addresses to the government in compliance with the law.

Albert Del Guercio, district director of the immigration and naturalization service, pointed out that it is important for each non-citizen to report his address to the government each January because of penalties for non-compliance. "A willful violation," he said, "can bring a fine of up to \$200, a jail sentence, and deportation. To avoid possibility of penalty, each alien should go to the nearest immigration office or post office during January, obtain an address report form, and return the card to the clerk after completing it." The immigration official stressed that no non-citizen mail his own card.
