A firsthand report of conditions in the Philippines and Southeast Asia will be presented at 7:30, Sunday, in the First Baptist Church, 2118 W. Carson St., by Robert Bowman, vice president of the Far East Broadcast Co., of Manila.

The Rev. C. Miles Northrup said that the Far East Broadcasting Co. was founded to provide radio facilities for existing Christian denominations and missionary organizations. It received the first radio franchise issued by the Philippine Republic and its eight radio transmitters beam a Christian message 20 hours a day, in 36 languages and dialects.

Bowman was one of the founders of the company. He has traveled widely throughout the Philippines and Far East. He is a former soloist on the Haven of Rest radio program.
