

Chief Cochise III Visits Local Family

A first-hand account of the many of the activities of the famed Indian chief, Cochise, was given to the Herbert W. Shirley family, 241 Via los Miradores, last week, as they received a visit from Chief Cochise III, grandson of the well-known historical figure.

Cochise III, or Nino Cochise as he is known in Tucson, Ariz., where he lives, was in Los Angeles on business and stopped by to see the Shirleys, with whom he has been corresponding. He is the son of Tazy Cochise, eldest son of Cochise III.

The Shirleys plan a return visit to Cochise in Tucson later this spring.

Witty Person
"He's fabulous. He's one of the wittiest persons I ever met," Mrs. Shirley declared.

The Shirley boys, Gary, 12, and Brent, 16, learned about the old days of the West. Cochise III remembers his grandfather slightly, since the old chief died when he was a boy. He also was acquainted with Geronimo.

Although the office of chief of the tribe generally passes from father to son, it is also elective and Cochise III has held the office for many years. He is a silversmith and writer, but was an ace in

World War I, serving as a major in the Air Corps. He also piloted planes in the more recent Berlin airlift. He has appeared several times before Congress, arguing the case for Indian claims against the government.

Nurses Do Not Treat, Health Official Says

Public health nurses and clinic nurses of the Los Angeles County Health Department do not treat patients, Anita F. Terrill, supervising public health nurse at the Torrance health center, declared Friday.

She pointed out, in connection with a story in Thursday's HERALD, that nurses are not licensed to treat patients but act under the direction of the district health officer, Dr. B. A. Kogan, and other physicians.

The Los Angeles County Health Department, refers patients whenever possible, to private physicians through the County Medical Society, she said.

Scout Jamboree Quota Not Full, Chairman Says

Twelve more Harbor Area Scouts may sign up for the annual Jamboree at Valley Forge, N. Y., during July, it was announced here yesterday by Dr. Allen E. Hofferber, Harbor District Jamboree chairman.

The Scouts making the trip will see America on a grand tour from July 3 to July 25. Dr. Hofferber said. They will travel on a special Jamboree train, he said.

Scouts may attend the National Jamboree if they meet the following requirements:

1. Be a registered Explorer or a Boy Scout at least 12 years of age as of Jan. 1, 1957.
2. Be an Explorer Apprentice or a Second Class Scout or higher when the Jamboree opens on July 12, 1957.
3. Be certified by Scoutmaster or Explorer Advisor to the local council Jamboree Committee and pay the Jamboree trip fee of \$436.
4. Present an official medical examination certificate of good health prior to departure for the Jamboree.

Youth Dies Of Overdose Of Narcotics

A Lomita youth south as a suspect in several drug store burglaries was reported dead on arrival at Harbor General Hospital, apparently the victim of an overdose of narcotics, sheriff's deputies reported yesterday.

Joseph Santich, 18, 25218 Fejoa St., Lomita, was taken to the County Morgue, Friday night. His parents told deputies that he had complained of not feeling well, and collapsed. He was taken to Hillside and Harbor General Hospital, where he was pronounced dead. Fresh needle marks were found in his arm, deputies reported.

A friend told officers that he brought Santich home Friday. He said that Santich said he didn't feel well and that he had had a "heavy jolt." Other friends admitted that Santich and others had taken part in a drug store burglary.

Between the garage and a fence at Santich's home, deputies found a number of jars of narcotics identified as those taken from a Bakersfield drug store earlier this week.





Tax Assessor Opens Branch Office Here

For the convenience of residents of this area, a branch of the County Assessor's office has been opened at the Torrance City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd., it was announced this week by Assessor John R. Quinn.

The office will be open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, between now and May 10th, Quinn said.

Taxpayers may file annual property statements with the deputy assessor currently canvassing the area or at the branch office.

Taxpayers may also, when filing property statements, make their annual claims for the veteran or church exemptions at the local branch office. Property statements and claims for the veteran or church exemptions must be filed by the last Monday in May, Quinn cautioned.

To avoid delay, taxpayers are asked to bring exact legal descriptions of any real property owned by them when visiting any assessor's office.

Look Editor To Attend Award Fete

Pete Dailey, West Coast editorial manager of Look, will represent the magazine at the presentation of the All-American Cities Award to the citizens of Torrance. The award, which will be officially presented to the city on Jan. 26, is cosponsored by Look and the National Municipal League.
